We have fifty solid blocks of rose hedges in Salem, and we want 100; yes, 1000.

The iris, the poor man's orchid, favorite flower of the queens, from Cleopatra to the reigning consort of England, attains great glory in Salem.

The dahlia from Salem has attracted nation-wide attention.

In all the galaxy of floral beauties, Salem excels, and in shrub and tree and vine and wide sweep of lawn or diminutive beauty spot before the humble home, Salem excels and may excel.

We have winding creeks throughout the city the banks of which may be braided and bordered with beauty, and the waters of which may be draped and filled with charm.

It has been said by a well known Salem resident that Salem's creeks would be worth a million dollars to any Eastern city, in opportunity for making them beauty spots.

Salem is not unaware of their value—and they will be worth several times a million dollars, for this purpose, to this city, in the future. A number of good beginnings have already been made.

This Salem Slogan issue of The Statesman is being published under the auspices of the Salem Floral Society, and the articles on the various subjects are worth reading and heeding.

This society has already done wonders, with slender means. It has large ambitions for the future, and it should be furnished ample means. If it could have 5000 members, paying \$1 each annual dues, that would suffice. And this would not be a burden for any one.
