Lumber Production 28 Per Cent Below Normal

Mills in Oregon and Washington to the number of 122, reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending July 17, show a total production of 61,595,290 feet, which was 28 per cent below normal.

Stimulated buying during the week brought orders, low production and restricted shipments within a few points of each other. The total new business taken during the week was 59,642,560 feet. Total shipments for the week amounted to 61,172,124 feet. The shipping total was materially increased by cargo movement. Car shortage continues acute. During the week under review, only 1330 cars were loaded out to transcontinental points. This is approximately 1,000 cars under normal. The unshipped balance in the transcontinental trade is 6774 cars. In the domestic cargo trade 59,545,643 feet in the export trade 54,773,188 feet.

New Welfare Line-Up Pleases Franklin Thomas

"The new lineup of the Child Welfare commission is a wonder," according to Franklin Thomas, retiring chairman of the executive committee which was discharged by Governor Olcott. In a letter to Governor Olcott, Mr. Thomas says: "We have had two meetings of the new child welfare commission and the new lineup is a wonder. Unless I am greatly mistaken child welfare in Oregon is going to come into its own, and I am only sorry I cannot be here to do my little part. I tried to resign the chairmanship at the first meeting, but they insisted on my keeping it until the end of my term of office, which is now very near at hand. You could not have found three better people in the state of Oregon for the job in hand, and you are to be congratulated. From all I have heard, also, there is no doubt but that the people generally consider the action taken by you to have been both wise, and for the best interest of the children. I say this in all due respect to the former members, whom I greatly admire in many ways."

New Reclamation Bill to be Drafted by Board

Governor D. W. Davis of Idaho, chairman of the Western States Reclamation association, has called a meeting of the executive committee of the association to be held in Boise August 4 and 5 for the purpose of drafting a new reclamation appropriation bill to place before congress. The former bill championed by the association, calling for an appropriation of \$250,000,000 was defeated. What amount the new measure will ask for is not known here. Percy A. Cupper, state engineer, who is a member of the executive committee of the association, has been apprised of the bill meeting.

BIG FIRE IN FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—One fireman was slightly injured and property damage estimated at several hundred thousand dollars had been done by a fire early today eating its way through the six-story plant of the Continental Furniture Manufacturing plant here. The fire was believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion. At midnight, five alarms had been turned in but the fire had not been reported under control.

Harding Senior Will Work For Suffrage

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 21.—The headquarters of the national woman's party here received word from the Marion headquarters today that Dr. G. T. Harding, father of the Republican presidential nominee, has promised to go to Tennessee if necessary, to help bring about adoption of the suffrage amendment by that state.

Dr. Harding was said to have telephoned this promise to the Marion headquarters today, at the same time time expressing great interest in the suffrage cause.

British Prepared to Discuss Irish Problem

LONDON, July 21.—The Sinn Fein and the British are prepared to discuss if they are not already discussing a basis of probable settlement of the Irish problem, according to the Daily Mail's Dublin correspondent, who says the Irish political circles where this report is current are usually well informed.

DUBLIN, July 21.—Inquiry concerning the report that the Sinn Fein

and the British government are prepared to discuss the basis of a settlement of the Irish question disclosed today that an eminent ecclesiastical with important Sinn Fein connections informed friends that he has received a communication with credentials which satisfied him that it had emanated from the cabinet. This he had submitted to Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization.

Many attempts, it is asserted, has been made previously to sound the Sinn Fein on the possibility of a compromise and there appears to be no reason to suppose that this will be more fruitful than others. The Sinn Feiners declare they will not negotiate.
