KNICKERBOCKER WINS SINGLES

Portland Women Captures Title in Valley Tennis Tournament Yesterday

Carl D. Knickerbocker won the men's singles championship and Miss Irene Campbell won the women's singles title in the big events of the fifth Willamette Valley Tennis Tournament at the Asylum avenue courts yesterday afternoon.

The match between Miss Kay and Miss Campbell for the women's title was the most brilliant women's match ever seen on the local courts. Miss Kay played a wonderful uphill game against the former Oregon state champion and had it not been for a few unfortunate shots, the match would have gone to three sets. Miss Kay had her opponent point set three times in the first set, but could not gain the point that would have made things look bad for Miss Campbell.

In the semi-finals Knickerbocker beat Palmer in a close match, and McDougal, Knickerbocker played very consistent and sure tennis throughout the day and deserved to win. Both his opponents played him hard but were erratic at crucial times.

In the other semi-final match between Dr. Bates and McDougal, the latter won in straight sets, though the match contained many brilliant strokes.

The most exciting match of the day both to the players and spectators, was the mixed doubles match between the local stars, Miss Marjorie Kay and K. B. Palmer and Miss Irene Campbell and Elvin Lantis. After the latter team had won the

first set Miss Kay and Palmer came back strong in the second set with brilliant tennis and won 7-5. They could not keep up the good work another set however, and Miss Campbell and Lantis won after many exciting rallies.

The men's doubles title went to Bates and Knickerbocker, McDougal and Palmer playing them close sets, but unable to get the lead.

May Get Water Route

From Lakes to Ocean

DETROIT, Mich., July 22.—Congress should act within the coming year to provide a deep water route from the Atlantic to the Great Lakes, as a means of developing the commerce and industry of the middle west, Senator Irvine L. Lenroot of Wisconsin told the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence tidewater congress here tonight.

"When the project comes before congress," said Senator Lenroot, "congressmen who fail to support it need not expect help from the mid-west on projects that totally affect their sections of the country. Development of the St. Lawrence river is more important to the prosperity of the United States as a whole than was the building of the Panama canal."

John W. Thomas, Chicago banker, said thousands of business men did not know they were suffering from a breakdown in the nation's transportation program which adequate water routes would avert.

The congress seeks to have work on improvement of the St. Lawrence begun in 1921.

At tomorrow's session, Senator Miles Poindester of Washington will present the views of the Pacific coast.

SEATTLE MEN KNOCK GOMPERS

Oppose Labor President Because He Stands For Prohibition

CHICAGO, July 22.—Declaration that Seattle labor was opposed to Samuel Gompers as president of the American Federation of Labor, was made today by James A. Duncan, Seattle strike leader and a witness for the defense to overthrow the government by force.

"We are against Samuel Gompers," Duncan testified, "because he organized the booze special for labor to go to Washington to protest against prohibition. Seattle is first, last and all the time for prohibition. We want a better, bigger and cleaner man than Gompers if we can get him."

Duncan, whose cross-examination was completed today, also characterized Bulletin Wells, former Seattle laborer, who he admitted was an inmate of the Leavenworth penitentiary, as a "fine, clean, high type of citizen."

When shown a card used during the general strike at Winnipeg, bearing the inscription "Permitted by authority of strike committee," Duncan said it was similar to the one used in Seattle, which, he said, bore the word "Exempted" instead of "permitted."

He testified that during the first days of the strike the strike committee organized a war veterans' guard to assist the authorities in maintaining order.

A. W. Swenson, a Seattle salesman and former commissioner of public works of that city, corroborated parts of Duncan's testimony.

ALASKA COAL FIELDS OPEN

SEATTLE, Wash., July 22.—Immediate extension of mining operation in government coal fields of Alaska has been ordered to the end that Alaska coal may eventually provide the fuel, not only for naval vessels, but for commercial ships plying the Pacific. This announcement was made here today by Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels and Secretary of the Interior John Barton Payne, who returned to Seattle on the battleship Idaho from an inspection trip in the north.
