Early Pioneer Visiting Salem

A distinguished visitor in Salem at present is Sister Mary of the Angels, who was among the band of teaching sisters of the Order of the Holy Names who first located in Salem in 1863 and remained here as teacher of music and drawing during the subsequent nine years, leaving at about the time the present building of the Sacred Heart academy was erected in 1872. She is still quite vigorous and has been located for some years at the provincial house of the order near Oregeno. She says there are wonderful changes in Salem since they opened their school in the old building which stood on the northeast corner of Church and Center streets, when the city was very small and their school was one of the principal means of higher education for this part of the northwest. She said that in the first year of the school they had 120 pupils and only two of them were Catholics. She is enjoying her visit

here very much and thinks Salem has become a beautiful city.

Prohibition Beneficial Says Gary, Steel Head

NEW YORK, July 22.—Prohibition has been beneficial to the nation's industrial and economic life, in the opinion of Elbert H. Gary, head of the United States Steel corporation, who issued a statement here tonight on the eve of departure for Europe, giving his views on the business outlook generally.

"The prohibition laws have had marked effect," he said. "In nearly every newspaper one will read of fewer inmates of prisons, almshouses and hospitals, and larger balances in savings institutions and better, cleaner and healthier conditions in the dwellings, all on account of prohibition. Testimony on this subject is accumulated day by day. From an economic pecuniary standpoint, I find the majority of the people in this country are in favor of prohibition and it is pleasing to note that the large numbers of workmen, so far as I am informed, subscribe to this view."

"Business conditions should be considered satisfactory," Mr. Gary said, although there has been a lack of prudence in business management since the armistice as regard prices. "There seems to have been a disposition on the part of the large numbers," he added, "to ask and accept the highest prices which could be obtained. Consequently there has been added to going prices the amount which the producer has thus been obliged to charge an increased price to his customers."

The disposition to work and produce has been materially diminished, according to Mr. Gary. He cited an instance which he said in order to remove and replace a headlight on a locomotive "it has been necessary to employ four different men because of labor regulations where one man heretofore performed the same service in less time."

"The rule has prevailed," he said, "of doing as little work as possible and of securing as large pecuniary results as could be obtained. However, somewhat to my surprise I have ascertained upon inquiry in the last 30 or 40 days that labor at our various plants is more efficient per man than it has been at any time before during the last five years."

No conflict exists between capital and labor, he declared, troubles in the past having been between employers and labor union leaders. He referred to the high wages being paid for labor.

"But it has not been paid too much," he continued. "There have been and are cases where compensation has been too low and work too strenuous but I have been speaking of the general rule. A majority of the employers and employees read and listen attentively to suggestions relating to their obligations to all others, including the general public."

Portland Can Not Prosecute Milkmen

PORTLAND, Or., July 22.—Announcement was made today by Lester W. Humphrey, United States district attorney, that an examination in all phases of the milk controversy had convinced him the government could not prosecute any of the interests concerned for manipulation of prices or violation of the anti trust laws. The producers and distributors are not involved in anything that violates federal statutes because they are not engaged in interstate commerce," he said. "Being under the agricultural classification, they are exempted from the food control act."

42 DIE WHEN SHIP SINKS

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 22.—The Mexican power schooner Jacoris Conde formerly the Japanese-owned Toni Maru of this port, turned turtle and foundered recently at night off Mazatlan, Mexico, with the loss of 42 lives, according to word brought here today by the motorship Jeanette R. Those aboard the Jeanette R. said that from information they had obtained at Lower California ports, not a person aboard the Jacoris Conde escaped, and that the tragedy became known only when bodies of the crew

and passengers began to wash ashore. It was reported the schooner was heavily loaded and theory was that the deckload shifted suddenly, causing the schooner to list sharply and turn bottomside up.

Begin To Buy Site for Naval Base

ASTORIA, Ore., July 22.—The first deed to a parcel of land within the site of the proposed naval base here was executed late yesterday. D. H. Welch transferred to Clatsop county in trust, to be donated to the United States government, a tract of about 45 acres of tide land located in Cathlamet Bay, above Tongue Point. The property was deeded as a gift to the government.

POLISH CAPITAL MENACED

WARSAW, July 22.—The menace to the Polish capital is becoming serious through the defeat of the left wing of the Polish army. In three weeks the Poles have retired from the Beresina river to the Neimen, a distance of more than 180 miles and the distance between the Niemen and the Vistula, which flows through Warsaw, is about 150 miles.

AGED MAN PARDONED

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 22.—Governor Brough today issued a pardon to W. S. Giboney, aged 64, now a resident of British Columbia, who in 1878 was convicted and sentenced to fifteen years in the penitentiary. He escaped from jail and fled westward. For many years he led the life of a farmer, trapper and miner in Stevens county, Wash. Recently he removed to British Columbia. The petition was presented to Governor Brough by former United States Senator George Turner of Washington.

WOMEN MAKE MOONSHINE

HONOLULU, T. H., July 1.—The chamber of commerce on the island of Kauai, T. H., recently voted unanimously to ask federal officials to station a prohibition enforcement agent permanently on Kauai to stem the wave of illicit drunkenness, which was described as "notorious." Colonel E. H. W. Broadbent, manager of Grove Farm, told the Kauai chamber that "moonshine" everywhere on the island was handled openly. Women, Colonel Broadbent charged, made most of the "moonshine" while their husbands and sons were at work.

MEN CUT GIRLS' HAIR

LONDON, July 22.—According to the Cork correspondent of the London Evening News, two girls who, it is said, kept company with soldiers, were seized by four men who clipped their hair.

SHIPPERS WARNED

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Warning was issued by the department of agriculture to shippers of fruit and vegetables that interstate shipments in package form must bear a statement of the quantity of each package. Fruit and vegetables in baskets, hampers, drums, cartons, boxes,

crates and barrels in general may be marked by either weight or dry measure, the department announced, while barrel shipments also may be marked in terms of the United States standard barrel and its subdivisions. Federal inspectors, according to the agriculture department statement have been instructed to examine shipments to see that the quantity of contents is properly marked.

PLANS CAMPAIGN

COLUMBUS, July 22.—Completion of campaign plans today engrossed Governor Cox. Democratic presidential nominee, George White, new national committee chairman, and other leaders remaining over from yesterday's convocation of Democrats. While hotel lobbies and other public places overflowed with Republicans en route to Marion for their presidential notification ceremonies, the Democrats worked all day in Governor Cox's office and hotel conference rooms.

FIND WILL OF C. W. WARD

EUREKA, Cal., July 22.—A will of the late Charles Willis Ward, formerly a wealthy lumber and nursery man of this city, was opened here today by David Ward, his son, after it was generally believed that he had died without leaving such a document. The will leaves the greater portion of the estate to Ward's three children.

BRYAN RESTING

CROOKSTON, Minn., July 21.—William J. Bryan, after spending the day here as a guest of W. G. Johnson, an old time friend, left shortly before midnight for Union Lake, near here with Mr. Johnson.

While here Mr. Bryan denied himself to newspapermen and all efforts to get him by telephone to ask him if he would accept the nomination as a presidential candidate on the prohibition ticket were futile.

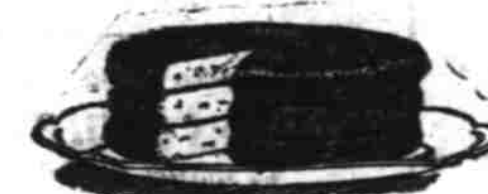
