FOUR RESERVES CHOSEN.

NEW YORK, July 21.—Four reserve athletes were chosen for the team which will represent the United States at the Olympic games in Antwerp at a meeting of the executive committee of the American Olympic association here tonight. The selections were: Billy Meaux, Boston Athletic association, 400-metre hurdles; George Massengale, University of Michigan, sprints; Carl Johnson, Michigan, broad jump; Aileen Allen, Los Angeles Athletic club, former national women's diving champion, high diving events.

PRICE SLUMP PREDICTED.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., July 21.—Slump in existing high prices next year was predicted by M. E. Foster, publisher of the Houston Texas Chronicle and president-elect of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' association, in an address at the closing session today of the association's annual meeting. Mr. Foster was confident that 1921 would see a marked decrease in prices.

Theater Owners Ask for Permanent Injunction

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—Hearing on the application of Jensen and Von Herberg, theatre owners to have made permanent an injunction granted last week restraining the picketing of their five theaters here by union strikers, was postponed today on petition of attorneys for the unions until Thursday of next week. Affidavits alleging prejudice against several circuit judges here had been prepared by the union attorneys who declared their first fight would be to get the case before a judge "other than those to whom they objected."

AUGUST 29 IS K. OF C. DAY

New York, July 21.—Pope Benedict XV has named August 29 as Knights of Columbus day at the Vatican, according to a message received here today from Archbishop John Bonzano, apostolic delegate to the United States. On that date he will receive the Knights of Columbus pilgrimage, which is to sail from New York to Rome on August 7.

"On the same day," the message says, "the pope will celebrate mass for the pilgrims in the chapel of Lourdes, vatican gardens."

KING ACCEPTS TERMS.

BEIRUT, Syria, July 19.—King Feisal has agreed to accept the terms of the French ultimatum with regard to lull in the Asia-Minor operations with the Greeks, awaiting the next move of the Turks. This move is dependent partly on the Turks signing the peace treaty, which is considered a foregone conclusion, but what Mustafa Kemal Pasha, the nationalist leader, will do remains an unanswered question.

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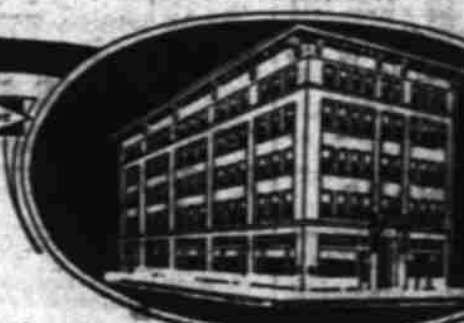
