Suffers Fractured Leg—
J. A. Pooler, a well known citizen of Salem, who resides at 1465 Chemeketa street, sustained a fracture of the smaller bone of one of his legs between the knee and ankle when he was struck by an auto at State and Twelfth streets about 1 o'clock Friday afternoon. Mr. Pooler was waiting for a street car and was standing near the car line in the middle of the street when the auto approached, going east, driven by Mrs. Z. J. Riggs, at considerable speed. Mr. Pooler states he took a step or two back from the car line, then stood still, thinking the auto would pass to the right or left of him, but seeing he was going to be struck he seized the radiator and held himself on the front end of the fender until the car came to a stop, the axle striking and breaking one bone of his leg and severely bruising it from the knee to the ankle. Both the driver and Mr. Pooler agree that his presence of mind in clinging to the radiator and fender is all that saved him from being run over by the machine and possibly killed. He was removed to his home soon after the accident.

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SECOND GAME
FARCE COMEDY

Vancouver So Easy for Senators They Simply Romp Around Bases

The farce-comedy enacted under the caption of baseball out at Oxford park yesterday resulted in a 11 to 6 victory for the Senators over Vancouver. The score could have been boosted to 33 to 6 without effort on Salem's part. Another game will take place between the same teams this forenoon.

At no time during the afternoon matinee did Vancouver furnish the shadow of opposition. They were helpless before the terrific attack of the locals. Vancouver's chief weakness which resulted in shaming the great American game by farcial plays was that it had no pitcher. The strength of the Vancouver team, Mohler, is not in the city, hence they sought to fill the gap the best they could.

Driscoll started in the box for Vancouver and all he had on the ball was a feeble prayer which the locals considered with heathenish aspect. Salem scored seven runs in the first inning, 10 men facing the groggy Driscoll before Jimmy Heffron put the derelict into good use and prevented further suffering. Baird moved in from shortstop and imitated a twirling act to the delight of some fans.

Two walks, two doubles, two singles account for Salem's seven runs in the first inning. The eighth run was made by Billy Stepp in the fourth inning when he stole home while the Vancouver back-stopper was sawing wood in the Standiford shipyard. The other Salem scores resulted largely from loose playing of the visiting team.

Dick Cox is still within the hoop of the horizon of admiring baseball fans. The coast league star continued to flash in undimmed lustre in the Salem outfield. Yesterday he was lenient with the Vancouver team. He batted only 500 per cent, receiving two safe blows out of four trips to the plate. Big league stuff in the fielding line was pulled by him in the fifth inning when he robbed Heffron of a hit by fielding a liner off his shoe strings after a good run. The catch was a one-handed one which received generous recognition from the stands.

The Vancouver fan stated that certain misunderstanding among the Vancouver players prevented some of the regulars appearing in Salem. It was his impression that they would be on hand to give a battle royal today and to hoist the Vancouver flag of honor high in the air. If their plans are not disturbed over the night, the fans are assured of a real game today. The game is slated for 10:30 a. m.

A certain Vancouver baseball fan, who seemed to have a matured civic pride announced yesterday afternoon that the story of today's game will not read like a chapter of Dooley's joke book nor will it resemble Bill Bryan running for the presidency for the "eleventh time." The fan spoke with authority and said that today's game will be a horse of a different color, that it will be a nightmare on Salem's part because Vancouver will win. This is his reasoning.
