JUDGE BALE PLEADS FOR MAN POWER

Chautauqua Lecturer Decries Lack of Interest Shown in Nation's Youth

GOVERNORS ARE SCORED

Prohibition Law Violated at Every Political Convention, Avers Speaker

The conservation and the upbuilding of the nation's man power was characterized by Judge Fred. C. Bale, who was for years a judge of a juvenile court in Ohio, as of paramount importance in his lecture "The Fourth Line of Defense" at the Chautauqua last night.

He named the strength and size of the navy and of the army as the first and second lines of defense, while the development of natural resources, such as industries, water power, farming and reclaiming of lands as the third line of defense. He said that the first, second and third lines of defense are important to the perpetuity and the integrity of a nation, but it was his opinion that consideration of the man-power is of transcending importance to a nation, and especially to America.

Feeble-Minded Too Numerous.

"Do you know," he shouted at his hearers, "that during the past year 175,000 young people were committed to feeble-minded schools, and to other institutions for the defective? Do you know that during the last year the commitments surpassed similar commitments for the previous 10 years? Do you know that one out of five failed to meet army examinations during the war period? These appalling figures mean that American manhood is physically, mentally and morally deficient."

Judge Bale in his lecture advocated a system of universal training involving the upbuilding of the youth of America from the points of view of mental, physical and moral considerations. In this regard he scored the present school system with its undemocratic plan, as he stated, not providing the opportunity for the full exercise and discovery of the talents and abilities of the youth. He considered the present educational methods as repressing the talents of young people by urging conformity upon them. He suggested more democracy for schools, more pay for teachers, equal participation in athletic contests where the entire school body has a part, instead of teams as exist under present day systems.

It is the opinion of Judge Bale that America has a wrong value of things. He labeled the present age as the commercial age, and said Americans interpret life in terms of dollars and not service for humanity.

Youth Has Scant Attention.
"For many years," asserted Judge Bale, "America has stressed money and not manhood. The things that have brought the dollars have received our highest consideration. We have maintained bureaus for cattle and hogs at Washington under the caption of animal husbandry, bureaus for crops and labor, and not until 1913 did the youth of America receive our consideration when in that year we created a child's bureau at the national capitol. Last year we appropriated seven and one-half millions for the animal, hog and crop bureaus, and to show how much importance we placed on the child's bureau last year we appropriated \$29,000 for that bureau."

Judge Fred C. Bale spent some time in scoring the laxity of the governors of the commonwealths for failure to uphold the 18th amendment relating to prohibition. He declared this amendment was violated at every convention. In this regard, it was his opinion that the republican and democratic conventions evaded the issue at their meetings.

RAINBOW TROUT FOR THE SANTIAM

Carload From Hatchery Will Need Volunteers to Distribute

William A. Taylor of Macleay, who has taken such a deep interest in providing possibilities of sport in the mountains and streams of Marion county has another batch of good news for the angling fraternity. He is to receive a carload of young Rainbow trout tomorrow from the state fish hatchery at Bonneville, with the intention of planting them in the Little North Fork of the Santiam, but he wants the lovers of good fishing to assist him in getting the young fry from the railroad to their destination in the mountain stream.

The car of fish will arrive at Lyons on the C. & E. railroad opposite Meham at about 2 o'clock tomorrow (Sunday) afternoon and Mr. Taylor requests that a number of those who are interested and who have cars will drive up to Lyons and help him carry the cans of fry from the train to the river, as there is no provision made for paying for such work and it must be done by volunteers. The intention is to turn them loose at suitable pools in the Little North Fork from a point a short distance above Meham to perhaps the mouth of the Elkhorn or above.

Mrs. Emhoff Said to be Woman Hurt in Accident

It developed yesterday that the name of the mysterious woman who was injured in an automobile accident near Gervais Thursday afternoon is Emhoff. At last reports the woman was still unconscious at Willamette sanitarium. George V. Adams, driver of the automobile, has severe body injuries, but is not in a serious condition. Another man who was in the party has disappeared. Adams is employed by the C. L. Boss Auto company of Portland.

Reports are that booze was responsible for the accident. Indications of this were seen by persons who assisted at the scene of the accident.
O. S. Piper of Portland was overtaken by the party on the highway about 10 minutes before the accident. He says he was driving about 38 miles an hour and that Adams passed him without signaling and that it ran off the pavement as it did so. He declares Adams must have been driving at the rate of 60 miles an hour.
