## NEW ZEALAND LAWS PRAISED

### Miss Blomfield Has Interesting Lecture—Maori Natives Entertain

"New Zealand has the distinction of being a commonwealth far advanced in democratic principles because 95 per cent of the people vote in our land," was the information given out at Chautauqua last night by Lelia M. Blomfield, a native of New Zealand, in her lecture, "New Zealand, the South Sea Utopia."

For this reason, she stated, the people of New Zealand are able to have the best of laws to govern them. It was her opinion that when only 45 per cent of the people vote in a nation, they cannot have the laws that will function to their best advantage.

Law Operation Praised. Miss Blomfield gave some interesting information in regard to certain laws of New Zealand. She said they have a law whereby pensions are granted to men and women who are past the ages of 65 years, if such individuals have been faithful taxpayers during their life time. Laws are now in force which make all tillable lands productive by constraining big land holders to sell the land they cannot cultivate. No land holder under this law, she said, can hold land for speculation. The real property must be sold at prices dictated by the government.

Also, she said, rigid immigration laws are in force which prevent foreigners coming in who are mentally deficient. Only English speaking peoples are admitted and they must pass rigid mental tests. **Good Minds Compulsory.** Compulsory mental and physical tests are made upon all students in the schools. Miss Blomfield said. She says this accounts for the progressiveness of her native country. In her final remarks, she directed a plea to America to continue the advocacy of true democracy. She said that New Zealand is a good democratic country, but that her native people have high respect for America as the greatest democratic country in the world. She paid tribute to America's part in the great war.

The Maori native singers furnished music in their native tongues. The music is a weird, fascinating chant, accompanied by equally weird gesticulations of arms and body. Several war-cry and dances were given, which resembled the antics of the American Indians. Native games were also given, much to the delight of the big audience that crowded the tent last night.

**Chautauqua Sure for 1921.** Twenty-one Salem business men signed the contract last night which insures a Chautauqua for Salem for another year. Pledges were signed by over 500 people, indicating their intention to buy season tickets next year. The businessmen signed on the strength of these pledges.

## E. M. LA FORE PASSES BEYOND

### Active Citizen Dies Suddenly While Listening to Reading at Home

Eber M. La Fore died at his home, 237 North High street, Salem, yesterday at 10:30 a. m. He was one of Salem's oldest residents, and one of the best known to the old timers. He was aged 64; born at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, December 17, 1855. He crossed the plains in 1882 when 27 years old, with his father and mother, and he had lived in Salem ever since. He was married October 11, 1875, to Josie Delaney, and she survives him. W. S. La Fore, a brother, lives near Turner, and Mrs. Freeman Folsom, a sister, lives in Salem.

The funeral will be held from the late residence Monday afternoon, conducted by Pacific Lodge No. 50, A. F. and A. M. Eber La Fore worked in a number of the old time general merchandise and grocery stores of Salem for many years. He was with the store of John Hughes, grocer, for a long time. He was a loyal and faithful Mason, and he was in the old days active in political affairs, and a favorite in social gatherings, and in these ways he had a very wide acquaintance in Salem and among the people of the whole state.

Mr. La Fore was a man of wide sympathies and sincere friendships, ever ready to help and sympathize with a brother or a neighbor or any one in misfortune. He had scarcely been missed from his favorite haunts, and had been confined to his home for only a few weeks. He was sitting up in his chair, listening to reading, when death overtook him suddenly, from heart failure. His widow and near relatives are assured of the deep sympathy of a wide circle of friends here and among all who knew Salem in the old days.

## Buenos Aires American Club Is Planning Home

BUENOS AIRES, July 24.—The American club here of nearly 200 members is trying to lease or buy a home in order to fulfill a long felt want for an American social center in the Argentine capital. There are a number of English clubs to which some Americans belong, but there is no place where Americans can get together and "talk freely" as one of the promoters put it. The board of governors points out that if it is to be a real American club it must be "the best," which means a good deal in this city of fashionable clubs, among them a luxurious German club. The organiza-

tion has a "nest egg" of \$20,000 to begin with.

It is proposed to admit women to privileges and make the club a center of all American patriotic activities. The American club at present holds a weekly luncheon at a hotel when the members listen to addresses by prominent visitors or Argentines.

## Pensioner May Indorse Check Without Witness

WASHINGTON, July 24.—Witnesses of the indorsement of pension checks will not be required in the future, except where pensioners sign by mark, according to an announcement by the pension bureau.

Four times a year, the 700,000 pensioners now on the government rolls have been required to have two persons sign the checks as witnesses of the indorsement, a proceeding that required the quarterly collection of more than 6,000,000 signatures. Decision to modify the requirement was made by Secretary Payne, of the interior department, after conference with officers of the pension bureau, the announced purpose being to obviate trouble and annoyance to bankers cashing the checks, as well as the pensioners.

## Dry To Notify Watkins of Nomination August 11

LINCOLN, Neb., July 24.—Aaron S. Watkins, prohibition nominee for the presidency, will be officially notified of his nomination August 11 at his home at Germantown, O. It was decided by the national committee here.

## BEADS WORN FOR LUCK BY TURKS

### Even Horses and Donkeys Have Strands of Them on Their Necks

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.—Beads are more necessary than bread to the Levantine. Men, women and children wear and carry beads to ward off ill luck. Even the horses and donkeys have strands of beads about their necks. "To battle the evil eye" and the long horns of the oxen are decorated with blue and white beads to keep them from falling prey to diseases.

In Athens, Constantinople, Tiflis, Smyrna and other cities of the Levant men of all classes carry short strands of bead necklaces which they play with while walking in the streets, riding on street cars and trains. Just as nervous men in the west finger their watch chains, bead-shops abound everywhere in the larger cities and general stores and market stalls sell them in the smaller places. Peddlers hawk them in the streets everywhere. Light colored amber beads of large size are the latest thing in beads for women. Meerchaum beads are also popular and for the moment plain beads of all sorts have displaced highly ornate carved beads of the type which Syrians produce in great quantities for exportation.
