Pleasure Cars Get No Gas Over Week-End

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—No sales of gasoline for pleasure cars were made today at the stations of the Associated Oil company here, and it was announced none would be made tomorrow. The supply for commercial cars, it was said, was being carefully conserved because of the shortage prevailing. Other companies were selling 20 per cent of tank capacity to all comers, but said there was a danger of the supply running short before Monday.

Aliens Sent From West Will Be Rushed "Home"

NEW YORK, July 24.—Thirty-five of the 63 aliens brought to Ellis Island from western and middle western cities are to be deported because of their radical activities, Immigration Commissioner F. A. Wallis announced tonight. Four of them, he said, were rushed to their native land, and sent to the remaining "undesirables" Commissioner Wallis

said he planned "to make quick work of these bolshevik deportees." The deportees were brought here in special cars from San Francisco, Seattle, Kansas City, Chicago and other western cities.

Nurse Says Woman Held Without Examination

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—Miss F. M. Pulos, a nurse, today filed a petition in the circuit court asking that Mrs. Margaret Idleman, wife of C. M. Idleman, former attorney general of Oregon, be freed from the sanitarium where she is alleged to have

been confined for 18 months past as insane without process of law. The petition alleges that while Mrs. Idleman is held to be insane, she never has been before a sanity committee for examination.

OHIOAN ARRESTED.

Aiff, arrested in Portland by federal authorities on the charge of violating the Mann act in transporting Mrs. Katherine Baiz, aged 45, from Columbus, Ohio, to this city, will be returned to his home for trial according to telegraphic request received today by Assistant United States Attorney Flegel from Assistant United States Attorney Reynolds of Columbus.
