## RAILROAD TITLE IS MADE CLEAR

### Supreme Court Rules in Important Case Involving Portland Property

The title of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company to valuable holdings on the Portland waterfront is cleared by an opinion of the supreme court yesterday in the case of Virginia Bailey and numerous other heirs of Henry Ploch, appellants, against the railroad company. The New York Trust company and the Farmer's Loan & Trust company. The opinion by Justice Bennett, affirms Judge Robert Tucker of the lower court for Multnomah county.

The land involved in the suit involves 150 acres, part of a donation land claim settled upon in 1852 by Henry Ploch. The land is in what is now North Portland. Ploch died in 1853 before any survey of the land had been made or a patent granted. Subsequently one Elizabeth Thomas filed on the land as a donation claim, made proof, and received a patent from the government. The plaintiffs allege fraud by Mrs. Thomas and aver that she knew of Ploch's prior holding, and also assert that the present holders of the land took conveyance with that knowledge. The suit sought to have the defendants in the present case declared trustees of certain parts of the land for the Ploch heirs, and that the heirs be declared equitable owners of the land. The defendants filed a demurrer to the complaint which was sustained in the lower court and which is upheld by the opinion today.

"It would be a dangerous holding, indeed," says Justice Bennett, "and fraught with evil consequences, to say that a man, under the donation

act could, by simply building a cabin upon an unmarked and undesignated tract of land, and without notifying the government in any way of his claim, secure such right to the land that the government could not accept other filings upon or effectually convey the same, and that his heirs could come in many years afterwards, as in this case, and assert his title, and disturb the title of the grantees of other claimants."

Again the opinion says: "At the time of Ploch's settlement and death this land was no doubt of little value; but in the long interval since then it has become part of a great city—has been laid off into lots and blocks—streets have been laid out and improved; and we may assume it has become valuable and that portions of it have passed into many different hands. To permit these heirs of his to come in now, at the end of 65 years, and disturb all these titles, upon the ground that they did not know before that their ancestor had ever claimed the land, would be intolerable."

Other opinions follow: Ida Barnett, appellant, vs. Florence Phelps; appeal from Tillamook county, suit for damages. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge George R. Bagley affirmed.

N. A. Burdick vs. Tam-a-Lum-Lumber company, appellant; appeal from Jefferson county; appeal from order of lower court relative to cost bill. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge T. E. J. Duffy affirmed.

Arthur Waldo Pettit, a miner, by Martha Pettit, guardian ad litem, appellant, vs. Cycle Supply company; appeal from Lane county; suit to recover money. Opinion by Justice Bennett. Judge G. F. Skipworth affirmed.

Ivy Hanson, as administratrix of estate of David Hanson, et al, vs. Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, appellant; appeal from Clatsop county; petition for rehearing denied by Justice Harris.

John C. Larsen et al vs. Vincent F. Wellner, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; suit involving custody of minor child; opinion by

Justice Benson; Judge G. W. Stapleton affirmed.

Petition for rehearing granted in Winn vs. Taylor and in Rovik vs. North Pacific Lumber company.

Petitions for rehearings denied in Lind vs. Boulin, Cramer vs. Alford and in School District No. 1 vs. Astoria Construction company.
