Military Funeral Held for Kenneth Aspinwall—Military funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the Evangelical church on the North Cottage street for the late Kenneth Aspinwall, former Company M man who died July 18, in Memphis, Tenn., S. S. Mumme officiating.

This was the first funeral in charge of Capital post No. 9, American legion, since the post received its ritual service a few weeks ago. Chaplain Lloyd T. Rigdon read the service and the pallbearers were some of his former comrades.

The church was crowded with friends and former comrades of the soldier and many sent beautiful floral pieces. The legion was in charge of the services at the grave in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

Mr. Aspinwall left here March 25, with the old Company M and was in France for sometime, making an enviable reputation for his bravery and work during the war.

Sues to Clear Title to Property Near Albany—Viola T. Wilkin has started suit against Belle Bryant, and others, according to a complaint filed at the county clerk's office yesterday, in an effort to clear title to her property near Jefferson. The property in question is a portion of the Edward fruit farms. She contends that she has been the sole owner of the real property for the last 10 years, and that she has a fee simple title. However, she says, Belle Bryant and others claim an interest in the property.

The original patentee of the property, Mrs. Wilkin alleges, was John A. Johns, who died intestate February 11, 1902. Belle Bryant, and the others involved in the case, she admits, were heirs of John A. Johns. Although John A. Johns relinquished title to the land before his death, the heirs contend that they possess an interest in the property. The case will be heard during the fall term of court.

BOARD APPROVES SEVEN TEACHERS Rapid Increase in Students Causes Congestion at High School

At the recommendation of Mr. Todd the following teachers were approved by the school board for the coming year at a meeting last night: Hazel Irene Browne, Majorie Alexander, Jessie Martin, Ruby Kennedy, Grace Thompson, Viola O'Connor and Buena Cobb. These instructors are to be recomended according to the salary schedule adopted by the school board some time ago. A representative of the Remington Typewriter company was present at the school board meeting and consummated a lease for 32 Remington typewriters to be used in the commerce department of the high school. The board agreed to pay a nominal fee for the rent of the machines rather than purchase new machines, due to the uncertainty of delivery. The Remington representative said that typewriters contracted for delivery in September on last May are not yet filled. He stated that the factories are swamped with orders for machines.

The school board sanctioned the request of Superintendent Todd to partition the room which has served as his office during the past year so that it will permit additional class room. He told the board last night that the average attendance during the past year at the high school was 812. A year ago it was 623. Mr. Todd predicted a larger enrollment for the coming year, both in the high school and the elementary grades. It was his opinion that redistricting may be necessary as a remedy for crowded conditions.

European Conservatism Gradually Giving Way—ROME, July 27.—One by one the last bulwarks of conservatism in Europe disappear. The Vatican which preserves in its life and ceremonies so many picturesque customs and ancient ways of doing things for a long time sternly forbade the use of automobiles by cardinals and other ecclesiastics. Funeral looking carriages drawn by black horses, conveyed the cardinals to and from the functions at St. Peter's or to their visits to the pontiff in the Vatican palace. Now several of the cardinals, including the English cardinal Gasquet, have motor cars which convey them everywhere.

Not so long ago the attendants in Elizabethan ruff and doublet and sword who marshal the spectators to their places in the great vatikan functions, did not allow the use of opera glasses to watch the wondrous scene. At the canonization of Joan of Arc a body of photographers were permitted to be present who took a film of the whole ceremony, so that when these picturesque historic processions no more occur, this reproduction will recall it.

ADRIANOPOLE CAPTURED. ATHENS, July 27.—The taking of Adrianople, according to an official communication virtually ends five days operations against Jafar Taya's principle forces. The campaign was carried out according to schedule, the arms in Thrace, on the Maritima and at Rodosto, joining forces and advancing rapidly and dispersing the enemy. The Turks fled in a panic, throwing away their arms and abandoning guns and ammunition.
