

FLORIDA MAN LIKES SALEM

Carter Comes to Valley in Spite of Warning by Seattle Knocker

"Salem is a dead town, and the Willamette valley is a poor country for you to visit," was the advice offered to Berry Carter by P. M. Howard, which failed to prevent the former's visit to Salem. Mr. Carter is registered at the Bligh hotel from Ecola, Fla., and he is in the city because he had read literature about the opportunities of the Willamette valley.

Mr. Carter said last night that he met Howard in Seattle and was advised to change his plans and not visit Salem, but to go to the Yakima

country where the "dollars grow on trees." Howard informed Mr. Carter that he was a former resident of this city, and that he was conversant with conditions in this community.

Mr. Carter visited the Yakima country and investigated conditions there and arrived at a two-fold conclusion, that the land was too high priced in the Yakima valley and since crops will not grow to advantage without irrigation, he decided to continue his journey to Salem. He arrived in the city last night and plans to stay several weeks investigating farming conditions in this valley. He says Salem attracted his attention three years ago when he received literature about the Willamette valley.

Mr. Carter owns 140 acres of land in Florida. He was amused last night over the coincident that his Florida home is in Marion county, and as he claims, in the best section of that state. Ecola is between Jacksonville and Tampa. Mr. Carter says he realizes a substantial income from his tomato crops, which is his specialty,

and from hog raising. He said hogs are raised extensively because they require little care.

"We grow peanuts," he said, "and turn the hogs into the field to feed." "I enjoy the climate in Salem," commented Mr. Carter. "The evening is so cool. The climate is not unlike our climate in Ecola. Our evenings are cool, and the mid-day is as warm as I find it in Salem. I am touring the northwest seeking a change of climate and if I find a place that suits, I am going to sell out and move to the northwest."

The Sherwood team of the Portland city league is a strong contender for the championship gonfalon of the league. Kracke received word from his Portland scout that the Sherwood team is stronger than any team that has yet made its appearance on the local lot.

The Senators are still intact, and according to Kracke, "rarin' to go."

Marine Crack Shots to Hold Civilian School

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 28.—Crack shots of the United States Marine Corps will conduct a civilian school at Mare Island, near here, from July 26 to August 8 at which students of universities, colleges and high school will be instructed in use of rifles, pistols, machine guns and automatic rifles.

Enrollment can be made by mail to the island or by reporting in person July 26. Men attending will pay their transportation to Mare Island. While there their only expense will be about eighty cents per day for board.

Globe Circumnavigated Through Artic Waters

SEATTLE, July 28.—First circumnavigation of the globe through the narrow waters between the Arctic ice pack and the northern edges of Europe and America can be claimed. It has been pointed out, by Roald Amundsen, Norwegian explorer, when he arrived at Nome, Alaska, recently.

Amundsen cannot claim a continuous journey around this northern rim, however, for the first leg was completed in 1906 when he discovered the long-sought northwest passage around America from the Atlantic to the Pacific. On this journey he sailed westward from Norway and ended his trip at Nome.

The second leg of the journey is being completed this summer. In 1918 he again left Norway, but sailed east, around Europe and Asia. Amundsen is going to Nome to outfit for a dash to the North Pole, according to Captain George Tonnerson, one of the explorer's lieutenants, who arrived here recently after leaving Amundsen in the northern seas off the Siberian coast.

American Polo Team Wins From Belgians

OSTEND, Belgium, July 28.—The American polo team defeated the Belgians 13 to 3 in the Olympic contests today. The Belgians were decidedly outplayed. The mallet skill of the Americans was much improved over that in the Sunday game against Spain.

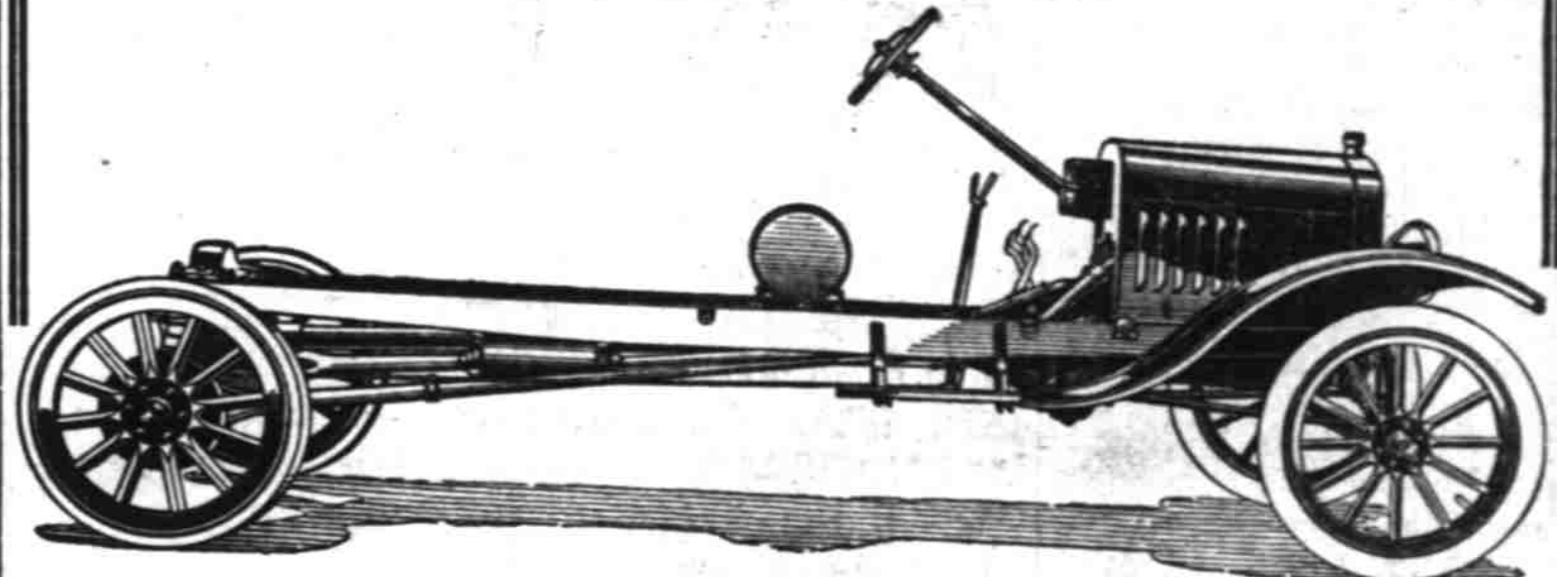
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
