WINELAND FREE DECLARES JURY

Automobile Driver Who Run and Killed Woman Wins in City Court

"Not guilty!" Was the verdict returned by a jury in the hearing of the Wineland case before City Recorder Earl Race yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. The jury that heard the case was composed of F. E. Shafer, E. Kapphan, Frank Jaskoski, Elmer J. Mangis and Emil Carlson.

The verdict of not guilty, according to the decision of the jury, exonerated G. W. Wineland from responsibility for the death of Mrs. E. E. Denison on July 22 during the Elks convention, and that the operation of his car was within the specifications of the city ordinances.

Chief of Police J. T. Welsh preferred the charge of manslaughter against Mr. Wineland, U. W. Macy, city attorney, prosecuted the case, while Roy Shields was Mr. Wineland's attorney.

The witnesses called by the defense and the prosecution agreed that Mr. Wineland did not drive at an excessive rate of speed while the street was congested with pedestrians. Ten miles per hour was the average rate of speed which propelled Mr. Wineland's car, according to those who testified. Some gave it as their opinion that possibly Mr. Wineland was driving 15 miles per hour when he sought to pass Dr. D. X. Beecher's automobile.

While being questioned Mr. Wineland stated that the fatal accident which resulted in the death of Mrs. E. E. Denison was the first of his life. He cannot be held culpable for any accidents during conventions, or occasions of parades, should be placed at the hands of those in charge. No cars should be permitted to operate

on the itinerary of the parade. The streets, one of the jurymen volunteered, should be properly roped off.
