

HUNGRY BARRED FROM NOON EATS

Y. W. C. A. Cafeteria Closes Doors Until September, Is Announcement

The Y. W. C. A. cafeteria closed its doors last night and no more meals will be served until September 1, was the announcement made by Miss Inez C. Cook yesterday afternoon. The desire of the officers in

charge to give the workers a needed vacation, was given as the reason for closing the cafeteria service for the summer.

"The cafeteria service has proven highly successful in every respect," said Miss Cook, the Y. W. C. A. general secretary in an interview yesterday afternoon. "The cafeteria was well patronized, serving an average of 90 meals a day. Our dining rooms were filled to capacity at all times."

COX BELIEVES HE WILL WIN

Invites Whole Crowd to Call and See Him in White House

DAYTON, Ohio, July 30.—Belief that he would be elected president was expressed by Governor Cox today in an address at the "home-coming" celebration here. After standing two hours under a burning sun, reviewing a parade estimated to contain between 8000 and 12,000 marchers. Crowds stormed the reviewing stand and insisted on a brief address from the guest of honor, in which he thanked his audience "for the testimonial" given him.

"I just said to a gentleman from Washington that it would appear to be reflection on one's judgment to desire to leave Dayton and live in any other place," he said. "Yet, somehow, I have a feeling I am going to reside in the house which you yourselves own. As the future tenant of those premises, I promise to take good care of it."

To another crowd which almost crushed the governor and Mrs. Cox as they left the reviewing stand and forced them to take shelter in the county jail building, Governor Cox said jocularly:

"I invite you all to come to see me in Washington."

The governor left his Trailsend library to review the parade, in the midst of completion of his address of acceptance for August 7, which he said would go to the printer tomorrow.

It was "Jimmy" Cox day in Dayton for the thousands who packed the parade route, released by a half holiday.

"Hello Jimmy," was the salutation shouted at the governor by hundreds of the paraders. "Three cheers for Jimmy," and "Hi, Jimmy, I'll see you in the White House," were other greetings.

The governor, waving a handker-

chief and applauding each group, responded: "Hello Buck," and "Hello there, Pete," and "Hello Ike," and "How are you, Charles?" were among the greetings he shouted back.

"I have seen men who have followed my standard for 12 years, who gave me confidence in 1908," said the governor. "I am prouder to have held it than to have inspired it at the outset."

"Jimmy" Cox also was the keynote of many banners on parade floats and marchers' banners.

After the parade the governor shook hands with dozens, until cries from women and children that they were being crushed caused him to leave. Hundreds then packed about the governor and Mrs. Cox and almost crushed them, despite a police escort. In the confusion the governor missed his automobile, finally reaching the county jail building nearly a block away.

Gaining its steps, the governor made another brief speech of dismissal, remarking that it was the first time he had "ever been taken to jail."

A flying wedge of police finally placed the governor and Mrs. Cox in their car.

Tonight the celebration was continued with fireworks and band concerts.

Anglo-Jap Alliance Aims to Keep Order in Far East

TOKIO, July 30.—The Anglo-Japanese alliance does not run counter to the league of nations, wrote Premier Hara, favoring a renewal of the pact, in the course of a contribution to the current issue of the Japanese Diplomatic Review.

"Mr. Hara declared that the English alliance is intended for the preservation of peace and order in the far east, with no particular country its objective."

The Japanese were determined to improve the relations with China and to develop the rich natural resources of China. It was a "good thing," he thought, that the United States was taking an economic interest in China. But while the interest of the United States was economical, to Japan the relations with China was really a question of life and death for the nation. He hoped this fact would be appreciated in a sympathetic way by the American people.

Concerning Siberia the premier wrote:

"The original object of Japan's expedition to Siberia was to aid the Czechoslovaks. In the meantime, however, Siberia has undergone serious upheavals, endangering the life and property of Japanese residents and disturbing peace and order in Manchuria and Mongolia. This is the reason why Japan cannot evacuate the country as soon as she expected. However, when peace and order have been restored in Siberia, safeguarding the life and property of Japanese residents, and ensuring freedom of communications, the Japanese troops will be withdrawn, with the repatriation of the Czechoslovaks."

STRAWBERRIES PAY

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 29.—Though the strawberry crop is only about 60 per cent of last year's in volume, it is expected that the higher prices being paid this year will bring a greater total return for the crop than ever before.

BUYERS PLAN ON PORTLAND TRIP

Pacific Northwest Merchants Conventions Will Be Biggest of All Events

PORTLAND, July 30.—The Pacific Northwest Merchants convention, which is to convene in this city August 9 to 14, promises to be the best attended in the history of the organization. Invitations sent out some time ago have brought over 200 acceptances, and what is more pleasing to the officers of the organization, delegates are coming from greater distances than ever before. Alaska will be well represented, and merchants are coming from as far east as Wyoming, Minnesota, Colorado and other states east of the Rocky mountains.

In connection with the convention, the Eighth Annual Buyers' week, inaugurated by the manufacturers and jobbers of Portland will be held. This annual gathering is becoming a splendid affair. This year the committee has arranged a very elaborate series of entertainments, including a "high jinx" for the men, theater parties for the ladies, luncheons, excursions to various sections of the city, sightseeing trips of interest about Portland, the entertainment program concluding with a elaborate banquet in honor of the visitors.

The committee in charge of the week's activities have advised prospective merchant visitors that if they should buy goods from any member of the organization, amounting to \$500, that their railroad fare and Pullman charges to and from their home city would be refunded. This magnificent offer is expected greatly to increase the attendance of merchants from the middle western and Pacific Coast states, and Alaska.

Two to Three Hundred Carloads Raisins Sold

WASHINGTON, July 30.—From two to three hundred carloads of raisins will be sold at auction Monday in New York by the California Associated Raisin company, the department of justice was advised today. The company also will set a price for the balance of the raisin crop August 9. Decision of the company to take these steps, the department of justice stated, resulted from contention by the federal trade commission that the company had been "charging more than a fair and reasonable price for its raisins."

The department of justice, Acting Attorney General Ames said today, requested the federal trade commission last September to conduct an investigation of the raisin company to ascertain whether the concern "than fair and reasonable prices for its products, and to recommend readjustment of the corporation's business in order that it might 'maintain its organization, management and conduct of business in accordance with law.'"

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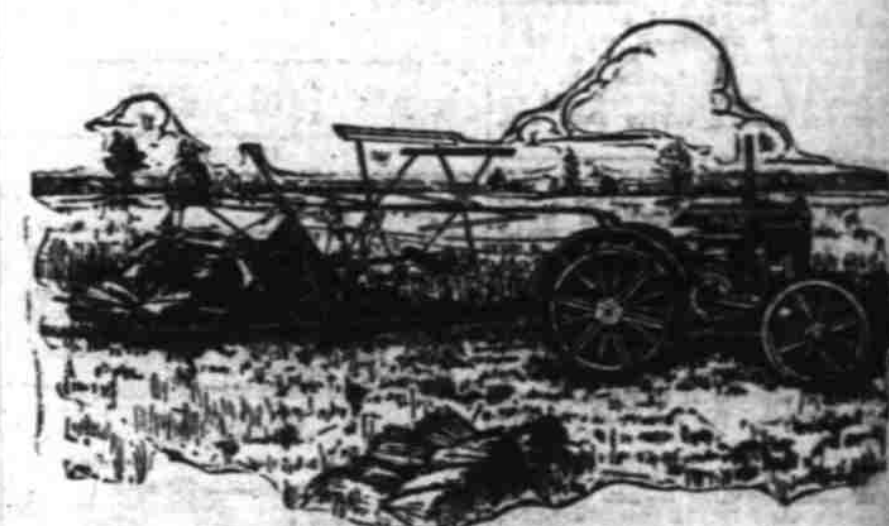
