## Forsythe Robbed by Men

He Gives Lift on Road

E. J. Forsythe, a traveling representative for Dinkelspiel & Co. of

Portland, yesterday forswore allegiance to the order of Good Samaritans following his report made at the

police station.

According to Mr. Forsythe, he was robbed soon after he had crossed the

ferry at Gooch while en route from Mill City to Stayton. He says Sunday was a hot day and he took

compassion upon a couple of pedestrians, who were dressed as loggers, walking

in the direction of Stayton. Mr. Forsythe offered the two loggers a

ride which he says they accepted. The men rode on the rear seat of his

car.

When he had crossed the ferry near Gooch, one of the men seized

him by the shoulders from behind while the other member searched his

pockets and removed his wallet containing \$45. The men then stepped

out of the car and ordered him to drive on.

Forsythe describes the men as wearing loggers apparel and to be about 25 years old. He says he will never befriend a pedestrian in the future.

## LAINSON SUIT BRINGS DENIAL

S. P. Agent Avers Negligence

Now Shown When Accident Occurred

An answer by the defendant in the case of Stanley Lainson, by his

guardian ad litem, Lu L. Lainson, against the Southern Pacific company was filed yesterday by John

Barton Payne, as agent for the company. Lainson was injured December 23 by colliding with a standing

freight train at State and Twelfth streets.

Mr. Payne denies the charge of the plaintiff that no precautions were observed by the railway company. Young Lainson suffered broken legs

above the knees.

The answer admits that a freight train obstructed the traffic on State street as alleged by the plaintiff in the suit, but denies that the train

was on the tracks for a considerable length of time. It says the train
