Production Lower, Buying Heavier, Latest Condition
Slightly lowered production, heavier buying and a further tightening in car supply feature the weekly trade barometer of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.
The association report for the week ending July 31 covers production, orders and shipments of 125 mills.
Total production was 2,500,416 feet. That was 19.51 per cent below normal.
New business totaled 61,524,583 feet, which was 7 per cent under production and 8 per cent under shipments, which totaled 69,376,169 feet.
Increased shipments are due to heavier water movement both eastward and overseas. Shipments by rail show no improvement, the car supply continuing to range from 30 to 33 per cent of requirements.
The balance of unshipped orders for transcontinental delivery is 5973 cars.
The balance of unshipped orders for domestic cargo is 43,622,025 feet and for export 51,196,621.

Puyallup-Summer Company Is Sued by Mr. Keeney

J. M. Keeney has filed a complaint against the Puyallup-Summer Fruit Canning company, alleging neglect and failure to compensate him for some cherries, which he claims, he sold to the representative of the company in Salem between July 23 and 25.

Mr. Keeney states in his complaint that a lot of 4939 45 pounds of cherries for which they promised to pay the sum of \$648.30. The cherries were sold for 13 1/2 cents a pound. The canning company has refused to pay for the cherries according to the complaint of Mr. Keeney.

Keeney asks judgment against the company for the sum, with interest at 6 per cent, of \$648.30, plus \$2.00, until the judgment is satisfied, costs of the suit and attorney's fees. W. R. Scott is named in the complaint as the agent of the Puyallup company, and attorney-in-fact.

Fullerton Has Praise for Vancouver Live Ones
