Commercial Club Gives Way to D'Olier Luncheon
The regular Monday noon luncheon of the Commercial club will not be held as usual next Monday on account of the luncheon for Franklin D'Olier, national commander of the American legion, at the Marion hotel Monday at 12:30. Pulp and Paper Mill in Prospect for Bay City
A pulp and paper mill is in prospect for Bay City. Frank Readen, representing the promoting company yesterday filed preliminary application with the state engineering commission for water rights for the development of power. It is proposed to use water from Wilson river.

More Highway Bonds to be Sold by Commission
Bids on a proposed bond issue of \$1,500,000 will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland August 24. The interest rate will be 4 1/2 per cent, payable semi-annually on April 1 and October 1 of each year. If the bonds are sold the total bonded indebtedness of the state will be \$16,243,750. Denomination of the bonds will be \$1000 each, with the exception of each 3rd bond which will be of \$500 denomination. Maturity of the bonds will be serially, \$37,500 on October 1, 1925, and an equal amount each April 1 and October 1 thereafter until the full amount is paid.

Socialist Candidates Filed With Mr. Kozer
Socialist candidates for presidential electors, secretary of state, dairy and food commissioner and public service commissioner for the Western Oregon district were yesterday filed with the secretary of state by officials of the socialist party. Dr. A. Slaughter of Salem, who was chairman of the socialist state convention at Oregon City July 3 when the nominations were made, filed the names. They are: For presidential electors, W. S. Richards of Linn county; B. F. Ramp of Douglas county; W. W. Myers of Clackamas county; John E. Johnson of Malheur county and R. R. Ryan of Marion county. For secretary of state, J. P. Sears of Polk county. For dairy and food commissioner, F. J. von Behren of Marion county. For public service commissioner, Otto Newman of Multnomah county.

Four Fatal Accidents Are Reported for Week
Four fatal accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending August 5, out of a total of 524 accidents reported. The fatal cases were: George Bowman, Sheridan, truck driver; N. H. Fennell, Algoma, Ore., lumberman; J. Houston, Klamath Falls, miller; J. A. Blair, Knappa, logger. Of the total number of cases reported 472 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 23 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act and 25 were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.

Keeley Appeals Case to State Supreme Court
