Noted Real Estate Man Dies at State Hospital

L. D. Kinney, whose real estate promotion operations in Alaska and in Coos county a few years ago gave him wide publicity, is dead at the state hospital for the insane. His death was caused by an acute attack of pneumonia. Kinney was about 70 years old, and was committed to the hospital July 3, 1914.

It is believed by hospital authorities that Kinney's fall in Coos Bay water front speculations was due to his insanity. Coos county is said to have been at much expense in straightening out his records.

Kinney's wife lives at Ottawa, Ontario, and has instructed the hospital authorities to inter the body temporarily until his children can be heard from. This, however, will be impossible and it will be necessary either for relatives to take the body at once or for the remains to be cremated.

Martha L. Cookingham Dies at Daughter's Home

Mrs. Martha Ladd Cookingham died early Sunday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. H. Roberts, 1337 North Winter street, at the age of 91 years. She leaves besides Mrs. Roberts, one son, J. F. Cookingham of Grandville, Iowa, and a sister, Mrs. M. B. Gifford of Jessop, Iowa. Services will be conducted by Rev. R. N. Avison at the Rigdon chapel Thursday at 2 p. m. The body will be sent to Tapon, Ia., for interment.

Former Salem Man Dies on Street in Portland

Charles M. Cox, aged 61 years, a resident of Portland for the last 30 years, and a member of a prominent pioneer family of Marion county died suddenly Friday morning following a stroke of apoplexy. Mr. Cox was walking on his way to work at about 8 o'clock and was suddenly seized by the attack at the corner of Fourteenth and East Ankeny streets, Portland. He was taken to the family home, 677 East Ash, but passed away within a short time.

Mr. Cox had been employed as a watchmaker with the Feldenhimer Jewelry company. He was born in Marion county June 13, 1859, the son of William and Adeline Frances Cox, both pioneers of Oregon. His grandfather, Thomas Cox, started the first store in Salem in 1847, the goods to stock the store having been brought across the plains by team into Oregon over the old Barlow trail.

Funeral of J. M. Walker Will Be Held Here Today

The body of John M. Walker arrived on the 4:10 Oregon Electric yesterday from Portland. Mr. Walker, who was 20 years old, leaves a mother, Mrs. Anna W. Walker; a sister, Mrs. E. E. Campbell of Chelalis, Wash., and three brothers, Burton, James and Willy, of Portland. Mr. Walker formerly lived in Salem, and was employed by the Wetli Fargo company and later by the Standard Oil company. The funeral will be held at the First Methodist Episcopal church at 10 a. m. today. Rev. R. N. Avison officiating. Interment will take place in City View cemetery.

Sheriff Needham Avers He Will Curb Speeders
