## CREDIT GIVEN EMPLOYERS

### Large Dividend Declared by State Industrial Accident Commission

A financial statement prepared by the state industrial accident commission shows that a dividend of 20 per cent, or \$506,616.26, has been declared by that department, and is effective as of July 1, this year.

The dividend is in accordance with section 19 of the workmen's compensation law and is made for the benefit of employers operating under the act who have contributed to the accident fund during the preceding year. It is 20 per cent of the amount contributed by the employers for the year ending June 30 and has no application to contributions made to the fund by workmen.

A surplus of \$402,742.16 remains after deducting the dividend, meeting the requirements of section 19 of the act.

The dividend, it is explained, is not a cash refund, but will be in the form of a credit. In its notification to the employers benefited the commission gives an outline of the procedure whereby employers may at once take advantage of the credit without delay in waiting for an official audit to be made of their pay-rolls.

Notices that the dividend has been declared, together with a financial statement, are under preparation by the commission and in a few days will be mailed to those employers who have elected to come under the compensation act.

### Proposed New Railroad May Go Ahead at Once

Final papers in the decision of Circuit Judge Morrow in the case of H. S. Huson against the Portland & Southeastern railway and others were signed by the judge Saturday in Portland, ending a case noteworthy for its length and the mass of evidence produced by both sides. The suit was brought to adjudicate the interests of persons interested in what was known as a "paper railroad" proposed to run from Salem to Stayton, through Minto pass to Mt. Angel.

Judge Morrow decided that the interests should be divided and issued an order of the court that the company shall incur no further obligations without an order from the court for them.

The settlement of the litigation is said to open up the way for active work on the construction of the railroad, which will reach a large untouched timber district. It is stated that eastern financiers are interested in the project and are ready to supply the necessary capital.

The case opened May 4 of this year and continued until Shrine week, with daily and often nightly sessions.

### Montreal Second in Foreign Commerce

MONTREAL, July 26.—The port of Montreal, in relation to the value of foreign commerce passing through it, ranks second in the western hemisphere and seventh in the world, according to the annual report of the harbor commissioners covering port operations during 1919, which has just been issued.

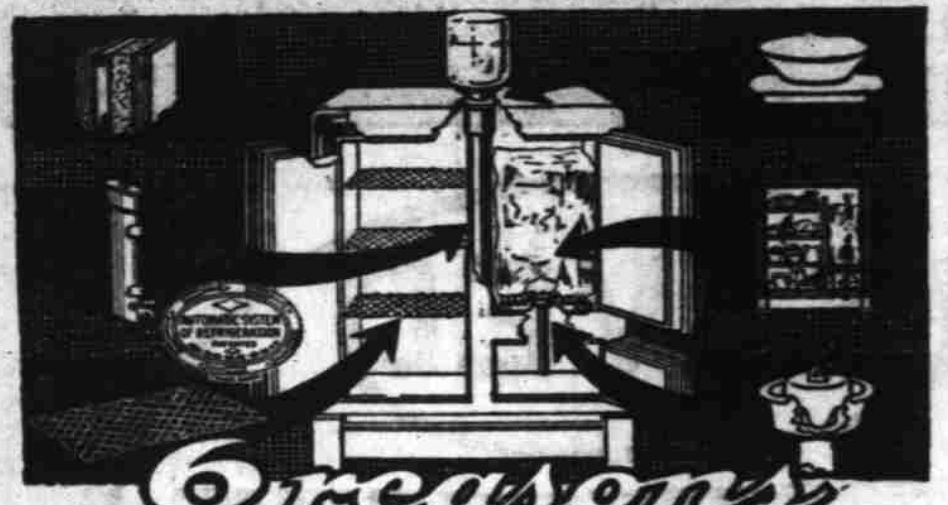
