Rehearing Is Asked in
by Clackamas Controversy

In a petition received yesterday from the Clackamas county court, the supreme court is asked to grant a rehearing in the action of W. P. Hawley against the county court. Involving a county road bond issue of \$1,700,000. A recent opinion of the supreme court invalidated the issue because it increased the bonded indebtedness of the county to more than 2 per cent of the assessed property valuation of the county. An amendment adopted by the people at the special election last May allows a 4 per cent bonded indebtedness, but this was not effective when the bond issue was voted in Clackamas county.

CHILD'S WINS JUDGMENT
by Decree of Court

Having failed to answer the complaint of the plaintiff, or to appear in court, Charles M. Fannelle defaulted in the case of Leo Childs vs. Fannelle. A judgment was signed by Judge G. G. Bingham awarding \$1450 in favor of the plaintiff in the suit.

On August 6, 1911, according to the findings submitted by Judge Bingham, the plaintiff obtained a tract of land from Byron P. Damm. The real property involved in the case is known as lot 3 of Rutherford fruit tracts, being a part of the Towns Savage donation land claim. The plaintiff claims that he has been the owner of the property since that date.

The defendant in the suit, Charles M. Fannelle, is alleged to have made arrangements for the purchase of the property on January 2, 1913, for which he gave a contract now held by the plaintiff.

At the time of the signing of the contract, \$400 was paid by Mr. Fannelle, and \$400 was to be paid, according to the contract two years later from the date of the signing of the contract, and three years later from this date \$1050 was to be paid. According to the contract, Mr. Childs was to pay the tax on the property for the first two years, and then the defendant was to assume this responsibility.

Mr. Childs alleges that Mr. Fannelle has failed to make more than the first payment of \$400, and has also failed to make payments on the assessments.

The judgment awards Mr. Childs the sum of \$1450 against Mr. Fannelle, giving the latter 30 days in which to make the payment, together with interest at 6 per cent from January 2, 1913, up to the time the judgment is satisfied, attorney's fees of \$75 and the costs of the suit. The judgment stipulated that the sheriff be instructed to be ready to seize the property of Mr. Fannelle in case the defendant fails to make the payment at the end of the 30-day grace.

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BOUTS STAGED
BY PRISONERSClever Boxing Matches Feature
Smoker at Penitentiary Last Night

In pursuance of his policy to create a wholesome atmosphere and to stimulate good will among the inmates at the Oregon state penitentiary, Warden Louis H. Compton has sanctioned boxing matches at the prison and last night six bouts were staged in the penitentiary assembly room.

Warden Compton says that he favors extending to the prisoners privileges similar to that of last night as long as they do not interfere with their regular work. The men trained for their last night's contests after doing their regular work.

Bouts Are Clean.

All of the bouts were clean and free from any viciousness. The men who participated diligently observed the rules laid down before the boxing matches by the referee. Clean breaks governed the contests.

The draw decisions of the referee were all approved by the inmates. Some there were in the audience who booed at the draw decision in the last fight, believing that the aggressive-ness of Carman Domingo and D'Arcy furnished the headlines for the card. It was a five-round affair. These lads fought
