Multnomah Lake Beds May be Rendered Productive

It is probable that the state desert land board will enter into a contract with Multnomah county drainage district No. 1 whereby the latter will reclaim the beds of Whitaker and Fairview lakes, both within the boundaries of the district, and the state will reimburse the district for the reclamation by sale of the lands. The district yesterday asked the board to fix a value on the lands and enter into such a contract. After an investigation it is believed a value will be fixed by the state. Whitaker lake contains 123 acres and Fairview lake 106 acres and the state holds title to the lands.

On grounds that the state has title to a certain 17.31 acres of tide lands which are under controversy on Coos county near North Bend, the state land board yesterday decided to advertise the lands for sale. This was upon application of Archie Phillips of North Bend who wishes title to the lands and who is in controversy with other persons who claim the lands are not tide lands and for that reason not state property. George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, and J. L. McAllister, secretary of the state desert land board, investigated the tract and concluded it to be tide land.

Valuable Real Estate Is Involved in Suit

Claiming that D. S. Hildebrand and Norman Hildebrand have failed to comply with a contract in regard to the sale of some real property valued at \$42,000, Kathryn Arnold and L. S. Arnold have started suit against them. H. A. Baker is also named by the complaint as one of the defendants in the case.

The plaintiffs in the suit claim the Hildebrands on July 2, 1920, contracted for the purchase of an orchard tract consisting of 70.22 acres. The contract drawn up between the contracting parties gave \$12,000 as the purchase price.

According to the contract, the defendants paid \$1000 at the time of the signing of the contract and were to pay \$4000 on August 2, 1920.

Hope for Wrangle Success.
Hope of military experts of establishment within Russia of a force that might successfully combat the Bolsheviks was strengthened today by the announcement of France's decision to give de facto recognition to General Wrangel as head of the South Russian government. General Wrangel has conducted a successful campaign against the red forces and the action of France is expected materially to strengthen this position, since he now will be able to draw on the outside for material aid.

Similar recognition of General Wrangel by the United States is not expected, not at least until the Russian situation becomes clearer. It was stated officially that this was not to be interpreted as an intimation that the American government is not in sympathy with the action of France.

MRS. WALSH WANTS DIVORCE.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 11.—Harry E. Walsh, a candidate for governor in the Democratic primary of Tuesday, was sued for divorce. His wife, Mrs. Emma Walsh, alleged cruel and inhuman treatment. She said she withheld action through fear it might endanger her husband's chance of election. Mrs. Walsh asked alimony and custody of an adopted child.

The plaintiffs aver that the defendants have failed to comply with any part of the contract. Only the \$1000 which was paid by them at the time of the purchase was actually paid by them. It is alleged. Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Arnold, the plaintiffs, claim that the defendants have harvested the loganberry crop of the fruit farm and have sold it to H. A. Baker, but the latter has not yet paid the defendants in the suit for the loganberries. He was named as one of the defendants so that the plaintiffs may secure the sale price of the berries.

For relief, the plaintiffs ask for the sale price of the loganberries which were, according to the contract, to be paid on the second payment of \$4000 on the farm. Also judgment against the defendants for breach of contract is asked.

Fishermen Asking for Temporary Restraint

Application for a temporary restraining order to prevent enforcement of the law against having possession or selling food fish caught outside the three mile limit off the mouth of the Columbia river between the dates of August 25 and September 10 was yesterday filed with the supreme court by the United Fishermen's Packing company of Astoria.

The application will be held under advisement by Justice Burnett until August 21. The petitioners are plaintiffs and appellants in action against Carl D. Shoemaker, former state game warden, in which they claim the law is a violation of the interstate commerce clause of the federal constitution. The temporary order is asked so that fishing may not be interfered with pending an opinion by the supreme court. The complaint points out that the state of Washington does not have a similar prohibition. The Oregon law was enacted at the session of 1919 after special conference committees of the legislatures of the two states had agreed that both states should enact such a law. The Washington legislature failed to do so.

Franklin D. Roosevelt to be in Salem August 21

Announcement was made yesterday that Franklin D. Roosevelt, nominee of the Democratic party for vice president of the United States, will be in Salem several hours Saturday, Aug. 21. The information came from C. F. Smith, state chairman of the Democratic party. It is said that Mr. Roosevelt will arrive here by automobile from Seattle about noon and that he will give an address at a place to be made known later. In the afternoon he will motor to Oregon City for an address at 3 o'clock and will appear in Portland at 8 o'clock p. m.

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CITIZENSHIP IS COMMODITY

Men Have Passports From Many Countries—Change at Moment's Notice

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 11.—Citizenship is a commercial commodity which is hawked about in the cities of the Levant with an indifference which makes westerners wonder whether the mixed commercial populations of near eastern cities are capable of patriotism and devotion to any country.

An American business man in Constantinople who was recently employing some agents asked many applicants what their citizenship was. Without exception the men produced passports from most of the Balkan states and expressed a willingness to feign any citizenship which might be necessary and to change as circumstances might demand. When the American expressed surprise they assured him it was very easy to get papers fixed up for a consideration.

Most of the Levantines who had German and Austrian citizenship have very speedily taken Czechoslovak papers or say they have become Jugoslavs. It is just as easy for them to change their nationality as it is for the chameleon to change his colors. Many Levantine firms have shuffled the citizenship of their members in such a manner as to have no difficulty in meeting any business emergency which may arise, and make claims on the various consular and diplomatic representatives for assistance in their commercial operations.

The fashion in citizenship changes in Constantinople and other near eastern ports just as the styles in hats. Greek citizenship has recently become very popular because of the good treatment Greece had at the hands of the peace conference and the general belief that Great Britain is definitely behind Greek commercial interests and expects to do its business largely through Greek intermediaries.
