There were times when I thought he ought at least to admonish them, in his gracious way, to change their course and lead better lives, but he would never agree with me.

In all seriousness, it may be said that W. G.'s inherited sympathy for all mankind was a matter of daily manifestation.

Mercantile company of Portland, the Azucenagu livestock & Land company, an Idaho concern, and the Tokay Heights Development company of Grants Pass.

STEAM SHOVEL ARRIVES.

TERREBONNE, Ore., Aug. 12.—With the arrival of an enormous steam shovel for the Western Diatomite company's mine at Lower Bridge and commencement of work on the warehouse the concern's employees have increased in number from about six to 60. Increases in freight rates have brought forth calls for more rush orders than the mine can handle.

SECOND WOOL CENTER.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12.—Finished woolen products from the mills in Portland and vicinity now bring in over \$10,000,000 per year, according to a statement issued here a few days ago. Increase of business has made Portland the second wool center in the United States, second only to Boston.

TOURISTS WILL BE PROTECTED

Governor Appoints Committee to Study Crater Lake Controversy

A committee of nine men was yesterday appointed by Governor Olcott to investigate hotel accommodations at Crater Lake National park and to devise some method of providing accommodations which will be approved by the national park service and the thousands of tourists who visit the park each year.

The members of the committee appointed by the governor are: J. C. Almsworth, president United States National bank, Portland; H. B. Van Duzer, president Portland Chamber of Commerce, Portland; John B. Yeon, capitalist, Portland; E. V. Carter, director State Bank of Ashland, Ashland; C. W. McDonald,

president Jackson County bank, Medford; F. C. Bramwell, cashier Grants Pass Banking company, Grants Pass; J. W. Siemons, president First State & Savings bank of Klamath Falls; C. S. Hudson, president First National bank, Bend; E. O. McCoy, Wasco Warehouse Milling company, The Dalles.

Salem Meeting Called

"As soon as the members of this committee send in their acceptance, it is my plan to call a meeting to be held at Salem for the purpose of discussing the situation at Crater Lake," said Governor Olcott, in announcing the appointment of the committee.

"The situation in regard to hotel accommodations at Crater lake is an acute one, and while I have every sympathy with the management and the efforts that have been made to build up accommodations at the lake, the accommodations which are furnished do not meet with the approval of the national park service, with the railroad officials who are advertising the attraction for the benefit of the state, and with a large number of tourists and others."

Tourists Concerned

The committee will have the pro-

blem of taking care of the interests of the present hotel management and devising plans for placing the accommodations at the lake on a basis which will be satisfactory to the national park management and to the thousands of tourists who annually visit this natural wonder."

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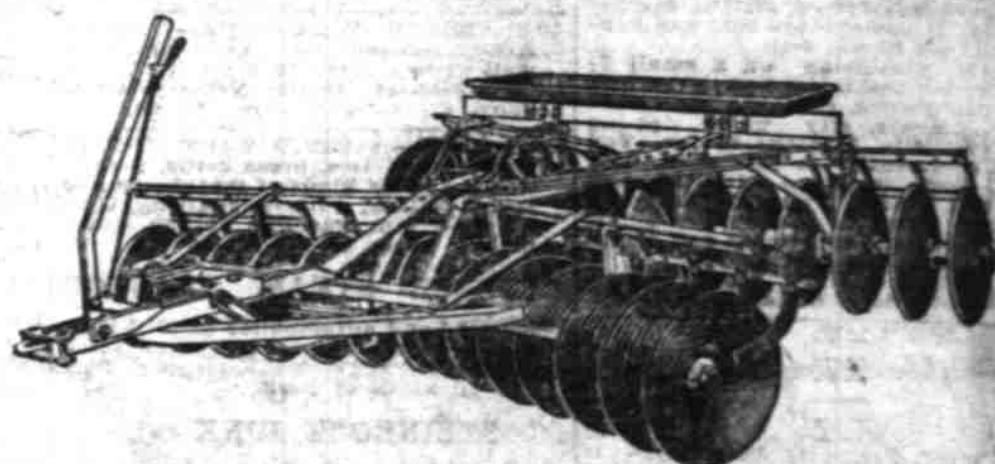

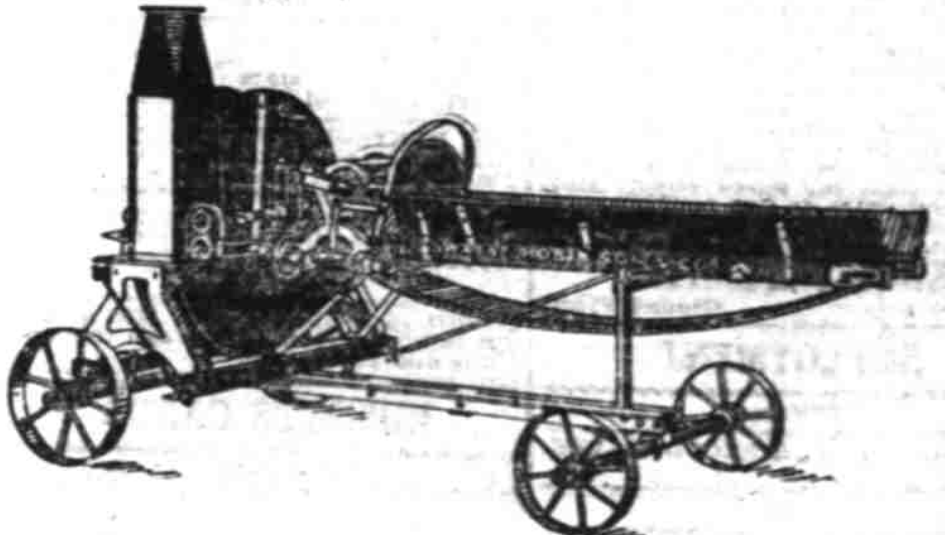
