

GOVERNOR COX DELIVERS FIVE SPEECHES IN DAY

All Characterized by Indulgence in Personalities and Flaying Opposing Party
MEETING WITH WILSON

Boasts "There Will be No Separate Peace, Because I Will Not Make One"

WHEELING, W. Va., Aug. 14.—Governor Cox today threw his force into the presidential campaign with five speeches here and in Ohio, all flaying what he termed the Republican "reactionary candidate and leaders" and supporting the league of nations as the premier Democratic cause.

He stormed the republican position, attacked the "senatorial oligarchy" which he said was trying to add to the presidency to its domination, denounced proposals for a separate peace with Germany as "perfidy" and charged that "a few men were banded together trying to buy the presidency." Millions on millions of dollars, he added, are being taken into the Republican campaign fund.

That Senator Harding is "surrounded by a senatorial ring" was asserted by the governor. He added that he could "not be kept muzzled" on his front porch by any ring.

Motoring from Columbus the nominee made three addresses en route, at Zanesville, Cambridge and St. Clairsville, Ohio, addressed the West Virginia Democratic convention and a public meeting here tonight on the river front. All through Ohio he was given informal receptions.

The league was foremost in all of his addresses. The Republican leaders, he charged, are behind a "smoke screen of hypocrisy—for one thing pure and simple, administrative spots." He also stressed what he declared was the fight between "reactionary republicanism" and "progressive democracy," and predicted his election.

"The outstanding question of this campaign," he told the state convention, is whether we are or are not to keep faith with the boys who died in France.

Declaring that the league is a pledge to those who died, Governor Cox told of his visit with President Wilson.

"I wish every American could have been with me," he said. "The president's whole thought is that he gave a promise to the mothers of the nation when he asked them for their boys and wants to live to see that pledge fulfilled."

The governor declared that the league also was a pledge which "will make war impossible," or practically so. The republican leadership, he said, was acting in partisan "bad faith" in opposing it.

The governor named Senator Lodge as head of the "senatorial oligarchy."

When the Massachusetts senator proposed compromising the treaty reservations, Governor Cox said, Senators Borah of Idaho and Johnson of California "served notice they would bring about a rupture of the Republican party."

The Republican platform, therefore, he asserted, was "ambiguous and meaningless."

In judging the proposal for a "separate peace with Germany," Governor Cox said it came from Senator Harding, adding:

"But he will never be given an opportunity to make a separate peace. There will be none, because I will not make one."

"I was not nominated by a senatorial ring, nor any other kind of a ring," the governor said tonight here. "I decline to be tied to my front porch by a senatorial ring. I deny it the right to hold me there, and when I am elected I do not intend that a senatorial ring, nor any other kind of a ring shall own me. I believe in the construction and preservation of the divided authority between the three co-ordinate branches as our fathers intended, each retaining its independence but not exceeding its function."

The Republican senator's purpose, he declared, with a fling at what he termed the "plural government" proposed by Senator Harding, is "to make executive administration not the affair of the responsible president himself but of the ring that surrounds him."

Charging the Republican party with being under reactionary control, the governor said Colonel Roosevelt's fight for its reform was of but temporary effect.

"Domination by political figures,"

once violently repudiated by the American electorate, is undeniable," he declared. "The men who control the senate are determined to annoy the presidency to their domination, and in what they believe to be a certain Republican year they have done things they would not have dared to think or doing in the past. Recognizing the unrest and the disposition of the people to shake themselves from conditions that surrounded them during the war, they argue that the electorate will return to the power not in power. They have nominated one of their number for president and then they have attempted to fasten upon the rank and file their creed of hate and intrigue. They discuss plural government with self evident candor. At times the upper branch of congress has exceeded its constitutional authority and it is dominated now with an arrogance without percent."

"I recognize that the people are restive; that their conveyances have been interfered with by war, that emergency taxes have been oppressive, but my message to the people is: 'Stop, look and listen before you step. Ask yourselves what reactionary policies have meant in the past. Reflect on the certain consequences of a senatorial oligarchy taking over the presidency and depriving it of the characteristics of leadership which the constitution intended.'"

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Hungarians Offer Poles War Stores and 50,000 Men

WARSAW, Aug. 14.—A delegation from the Hungarian parliament today visited the vice president of the Polish national council of defense and renewed the Hungarian proposal to aid Poland. The Hungarians are said to have offered to place at Poland's disposal 50,000 men and stores of arms and munitions, to supply wheat, and to furnish the services of the Hungarian Red Cross.

President Pilsudski, in receiving a delegation of Warsaw citizens, today declared that the government was decided to fulfill its duty to the end. He said the capital would be defended until the last extremity.

Marshal Joffre left Paris tonight for Rumania. He will present the croix de guerre to several Rumanian cities, among them Bucharest.

Cox Has First Campaign Heckling Experience

WHEELING, W. Va., Aug. 14.—The governor tonight said that he would accept reservations to the league of nations which would be interpretative "but none that impairs."

During the meeting, the governor had his first campaign heckling experience. When he declared Ohio's laws had been upheld a man in the crowd shouted "No." The governor stopped his address and despite cries of "throw him out," insisted that the man be heard. The intervener said he referred to "the dirtiness of the liquor business along the Ohio river towns near his home. Governor Cox replied with a reassertion that the Ohio laws had been upheld.

Accidental Shooting Fatal Near Milton

WALLA, WALLA, Wash., Aug. 14.—Melvin Olinger, thirteen years old, son of Jasper Olinger of Milton, Or., was accidentally shot and killed by Mansford Brittain, a companion, at Sallings camp in the Blue mountains, east of Milton this morning. The boys, with Olinger's father and three other sons were camping and the two lads had gone out before breakfast hunting. Brittain was discharged, the bullet striking Olinger in the heart and killing him instantly.

SEARCH FOR SEAPLANES

Two destroyers were despatched from the Mare Island navy yard tonight in search of the two missing seaplanes. No report had been received from the planes since nightfall, naval officials stated.

Commander Bertholf gave the status of the 11 planes as follows: Numbers 1, 2, 5, 6, 9, and 12, safe in the bay off Sausalito; Nos. 4 and 11 unaccounted for; Nos. 7 and 10 at Guadalupe, California, 20 miles south of Point Reyes and north of San Francisco; No. 8 at Greenwood, Cal.

90 Percent of German People Barely Exist

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—More than 90 per cent of the people of Germany are trying to exist, according to a Berlin statistician, on incomes which do not equal the present minimum cost of living. The mark today, he reckons, has a purchasing value equal to only about one-twelfth that of pre-war times. He shows that in 1914 the minimum cost of rental, food, clothing and other necessities for a man, wife and two children was 1,500 marks a year. Now this minimum cost is estimated at 19,300 marks.

Marriages Fluctuate With Money Conditions

TOKIO, Japanese find a close connection between money and marriage by reading the lessons of the existing financial depression in Japan.

The passing of easy money-making has caused a rush to the Japanese matrimonial agencies and women are leading in the rush. In prosperous times the agency customers are men looking for wives, but now, say matrimonial managers, the old order is reversed. In view of the approaching "hard times" women are apparently seeking safety in the protection of husbands.

One result of the feminine advance is a marked increase in marriages.

Mexico's Warships to Become Merchant Ships

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 11.—By an order of the secretariat of war and marine, Mexico's warships in the Gulf of Mexico will be converted into merchant vessels. The Zaragoza, Progreso, and Sonora will engage in the coast trade, touching Vera Cruz, Tampico and other gulf ports.
