New Investment Company Organized at Bay City

The Bay City Investment company, capitalized at \$155,000, filed articles of incorporation Saturday at the office of T. B. Handley, state corporation commissioner. Bay City will be the place of business. The incorporators are R. C. Magarrett, Solon Schiffmann, Webster Holmes, B. L. Heals Jr., and Theresa M. Gaylord.

Articles of incorporation were filed by the Hodson-Elrod company of Portland, capitalized at \$40,000. The incorporators are C. W. Hodson, J. O. Elrod and W. H. Buoy.

Resolutions showing a decrease in capitalization from \$1800 to \$750 were filed by the Poe Valley & Klamath Falls Telephone company. Resolutions of dissolution were filed by the Ralston-Debe company of Portland.

German Towns Stop Street Car Service

BERLIN, Aug. 11.—Owing to the enormous increase in the cost of operation, street car service in many of the smaller German cities has been discontinued. Jena, Weimburg, Freiburg and Heilbronn are among the towns trying now to get along without trams. Attempts were made to keep the lines going by radical increases in fares, but the public, unable to pay the price, took to walking.

Berlin and other large cities, where street car traffic has fallen off alarmingly because of increased fares, are facing the problem of reorganizing the service, retaining only those lines which are absolutely necessary for the accommodation of persons having to travel long distances. Wagons and carts brought out to give a lift to pedestrians during recent strikes of street car employees have indicated which routes through Berlin are vital for transportation.

BEARCATS WILL BE FORMIDABLE

Some Men Gone, but Matthews Likes Looks of His Football Material

Advance information may be unreasonable under certain circumstances, but none will gainsay that the football season is just around the corner. In fact, some gridiron camps of the country are now being made ready for the training of candidates. These early camps are in the east. Western teams will start the ball a-bounding the latter part of August and all of the teams will be going through the paces during the early part of September.

While the prospects at various colleges and universities are of interest to local people, keen interest is held regarding the gridiron prospect of the Willamette Bearcats. The 1920 football season finds the Bearcats, for the first time in history, members of the northwest intercollegiate conference. Although several games have been scheduled with conference teams, it is unlikely that the local team will enter as a participant in regularly scheduled contests.

Four Men Missing.

Four members of the Bearcat eleven will be missing this fall when Coach R. L. Matthews makes the call for candidates on Sweetland field. Dimick, halfback; Brown, tackle; Tobie, tackle, and Vinson, an end, are the men whose positions will be filled with new men next month. Dimick and Brown left the Bearcat fold by graduation; Tobie quit college and is employed in Washington, near Spokane, as assistant superintendent of a state farm for boys. Bill Vinson's football career was abruptly checked last fall when he had to submit to an operation.

The rest of the men who have donned the moleskin for Willamette are out in the harvest fields, road construction work and forest reserve trail blazing, or fighting forest fires. They plan to return to Willamette this fall prepared to withstand rigid pre-season training.

"Russ" Rarey, fullback and captain of the Bearcats, was in the city last week, having returned here from Wasco where he had been working in the harvest fields. He injured his knee while pitching hay, and he is on his way home to Tacoma so that he may be in the best of condition for the fall season. Coach Matthews relies on Rarey for the success and effectiveness of his backfield, for "Russ" was a smashing ground gainer last season.

Ganzans, sub-quarter of last season, is fighting fires in the wilds of Idaho. "Tuffy" Irvine, the Bearcat pilot of last season, is conditioning himself by juggling trucks in Portland. "Fat" Zeller, the halfback who hits the line with a crash for consistent gains, is helping his father harvest alfalfa at Sunnyside, Wash. Zeller made three-fourths of the touchdowns made by the Bearcats last season by his shifty whirling running. Frequently he made runs of 35 to 60 yards after plunging through the line.

Coach Matthews has several candidates for backfield positions to replace those who have left school. The second team of last fall had several members of varsity caliber in Barnes, Sherwood, Ramsey, Powers, Nickle and Harry Rarey.

The line was the weakest point in the defense of the Bearcats last fall, and, according to advance dope, with the nucleus of old members who will report at the beginning of the season, the eleven this fall will have an exceptionally strong line. Of last year's team, Coach Matthews will have four men as a nucleus for the line.

Bill Lawson, guard; Basler, center; Day, guard, and Wapato, end, compose the veteran line. Word has come from the other members of the Bearcat eleven that new men have signified their intention to enroll in Willamette this fall, and that the men are good football prospects.

A game with Whitman college for Thanksgiving day and tentative games with O. A. C. and Oregon are on the schedule of the Bearcats for the coming season. It is likely that a game will be arranged with Gonzaga university of Spokane, in addition to the games usually scheduled by Coach Matthews.
