ONE of the most noteworthy initial announcements concerning the 59th Oregon state fair which begins September 27th is that of Americanization day which will be held on Friday. Mrs. Isaac Lee Patterson of Salem, vice president general of the national society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, will have entire jurisdiction, and she will ask to assist her as patronesses for the day the wives of the foreign consuls, and those of the pastors of foreign-speaking churches of both Portland and Salem.

Mrs. Patterson is eminently qualified to undertake the work, having made an exhaustive study of Americanization plans of various communities all over the country. She is interested in having these days made a part of state fairs throughout the land, and it is probable that the one in Salem this year will serve as an example for others elsewhere.

Citizens of allied countries will come first in the honors of the day, but every country will be given a place on the day's program. Heads of families naturalized this year will be admitted free with their families.

Outstanding in the activities will be the mass singing at the races, with Walter A. Jenkins, community leader of Portland, in charge. Special programs in the auditorium during the afternoon and evening will be devoted to naturalized foreigners,

and will include folk dances, singing of folk songs, addresses and vocal numbers by foreign-born folk who have made a place for themselves in the state. Moving pictures will also emphasize the Americanization note.
