Son-in-Law and Daughter Are Sued by Aged Woman

Claiming that her own daughter, Minnie Hurley, and her husband, J. T. Hurley, conspired to defraud her by false and fraudulent representations, of her property consisting of 80 acres which she values at \$11,000, was made in a complaint filed against the two yesterday by Mrs. Barbara E. Robbins.

Mrs. Robbins asserts that sometime during the early part of 1916 her daughter presented a plan to her whereby she was to be kept and cared for during the rest of her lifetime. If she would consent to have her daughter and husband live on and operate the farm, Mrs. Robbins says she consented to the offer of her daughter.

On October 6, 1917, Mrs. Robbins, it is alleged, consented to a deed and delivered it to her daughter, for which the defendants agreed to "support the plaintiff during the remainder of her natural life and to furnish her with suitable board, lodging, clothes, medical attention, care and attention, and at her death to furnish her with a fitting and suitable burial." In addition to these stipulations, the plaintiff was to receive a consideration of \$2,000. All of this, according to the plaintiff in the suit has been disregarded by Mrs. Hurley, and furthermore, she asserts the \$2,000 is yet unpaid. During the early part of July

1920, the plaintiff asserts that she was committed to the Oregon state hospital as the result of a complaint filed against her by her daughter. She consented to the commitment when at the hearing before Judge W. M. Bushley she was informed that her attorney would be cured should she go to the hospital. Mrs. Robbins says she was not insane. She was discharged from the hospital on July 27, 1920.

Herbert Hoover Spends Few Quiet Hours in Town

Herbert Hoover, food administrator during the world war and who was a candidate for the Republican nomination for president of the United States, was in Salem Monday night and until the middle of the forenoon Tuesday, while traveling with his family incognito by automobile.

Mr. Hoover was accompanied by Mrs. Hoover and their sons, Herbert Jr., and Allan. Mrs. Hoover registered the family as Mr. and Mrs. H. Henry Hoover and sons, California, the writing scarcely legible on the hotel register. A hotel clerk recognized Mr. Hoover Tuesday.
