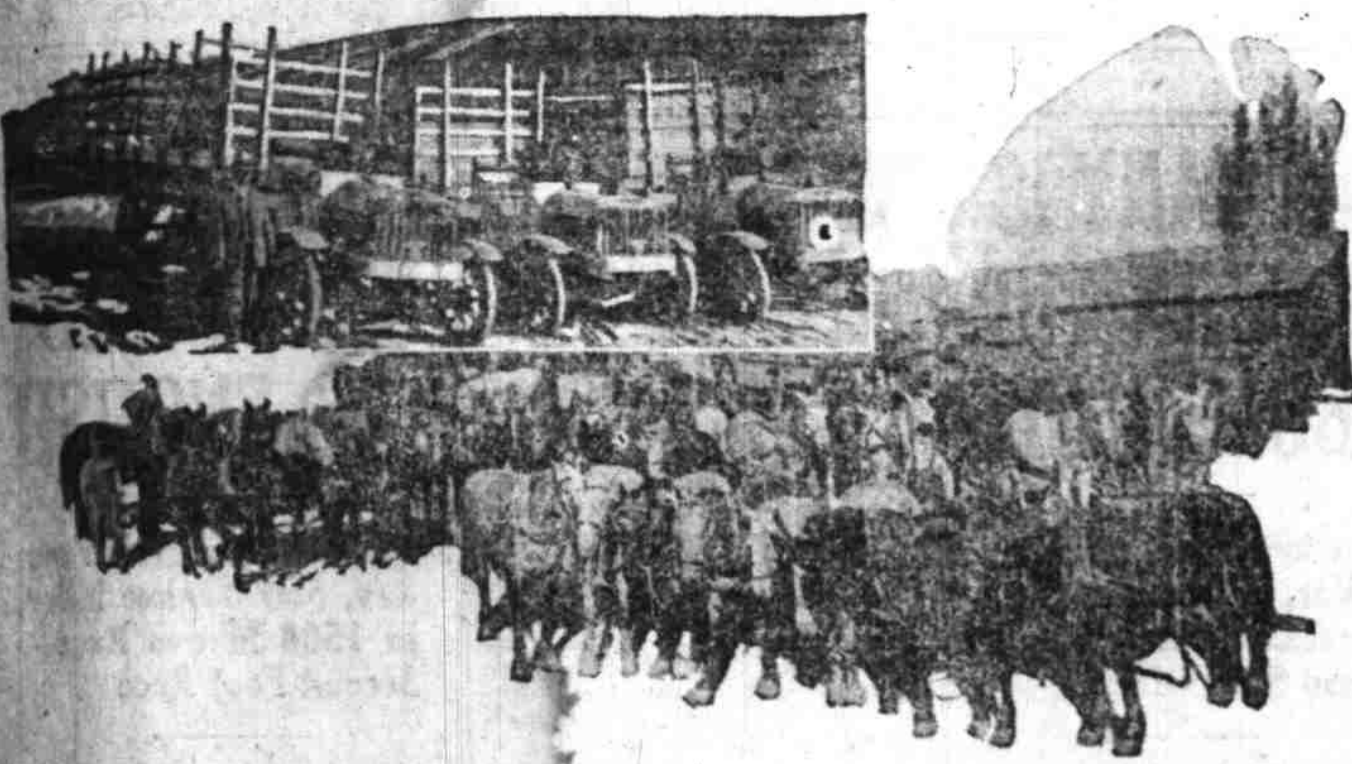


Three Motor Tractors Replace 120-Horse Equipment

Looks To Constitution
"I want America to understand that a Republican administration stands unalterably, avowedly and proudly for the constitutional government, with the recognized and sustained powers of the legislative and judicial branches of the government, as well as that of the executive."

Legislature is Audience
The speech was delivered from the front porch and was cheered by a delegation of members and former members of the Ohio legislature. It was the second today's group of Civil War veterans in Kenton, Ohio, having induced him to make a brief talk when they had him a noonday visit. To them he reiterated his belief that it was for American rights that the nation entered the world war and added a promise that if he were elected there would be no surrender of American nationality.

Merely Protected Rights
"There have been varying opinions expressed," he said, "as to why your grandsons went into the great war. Some have said it was for democracy and some have said it was to make sure there would be no more wars. But if we went in for democracy's sake, oughtn't we to have gotten into it when it started? And if we went in to make sure there would be no more wars should we have waited until millions had been sacrificed?"

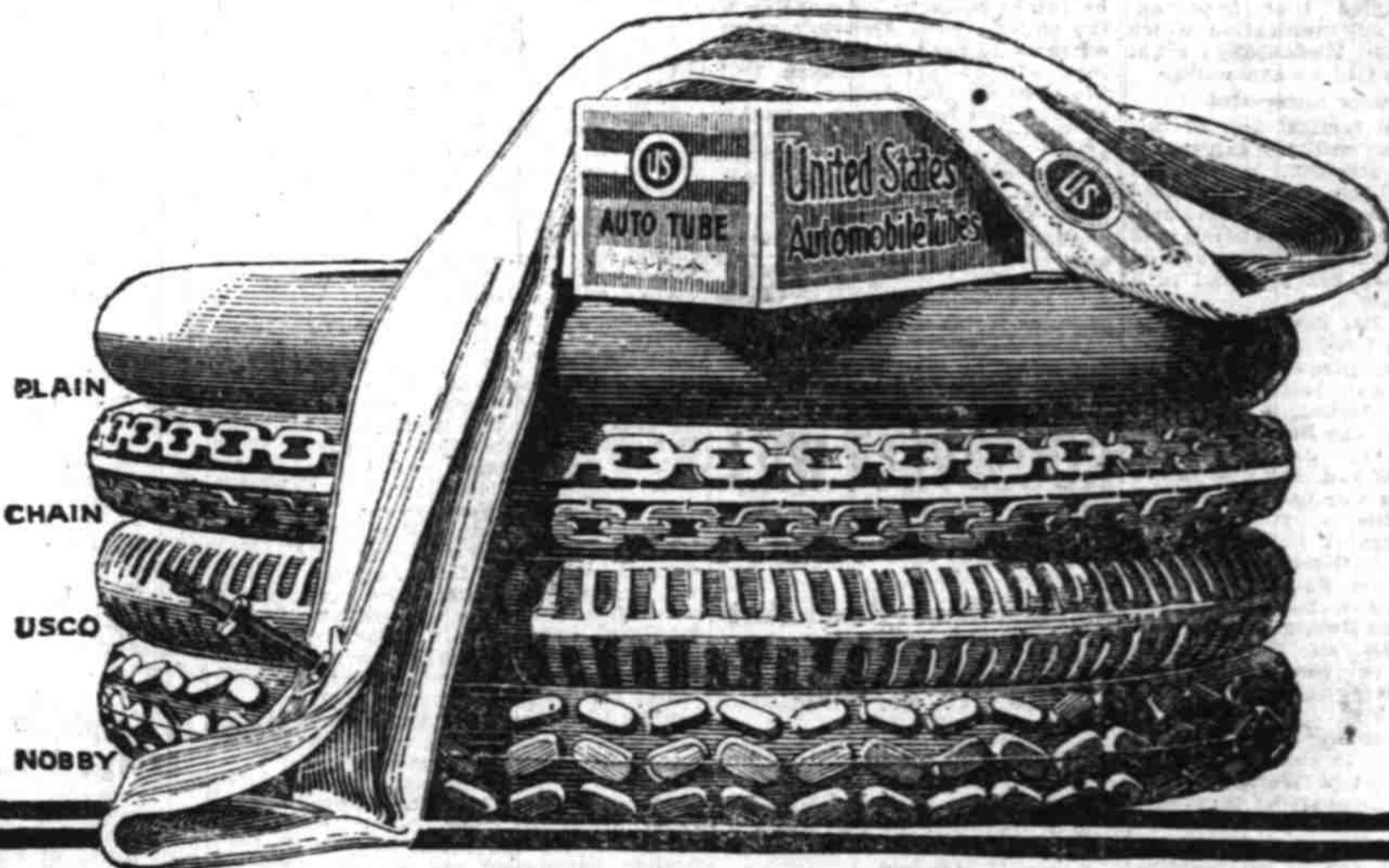
