**DAMAGES ARE DEMANDED BY GATES YOUTHS**

**Smith and Wolfe File Cross Complaint Against Odd Fellows Lodge**

**SENSATION IS ADDED War Veteran Avers Dance Hall Manager Is Jealous of His Success**

Claiming that the plaintiff injured their reputations by making wilfully false and vindictive charges against them, the defendants in the suit of Green Mountain lodge, I. O. O. F. of Gates, vs. Gerald Wolfe and Wilbur Smith, yesterday filed an answer and cross-complaint to the complaint denying a greater portion of the allegations indicated in the complaint and assert that \$20,000 represents the equivalent of the damage suffered by their reputations in their community.

**Intoxication Denied.** The defendants admit the allegation that on August 14 they were at the dance hall, but deny that they were intoxicated. Wolfe and Smith assert that they were sober, peaceable, and conducted themselves in a gentlemanly manner on August 14, when one of the defendants, Gerald Wolfe, was forcibly ejected from the dance hall as an undesirable character. Wolfe claims that the motive for his ejection was jealousy.

On August 14, according to their answer, Wilbur Smith visited the dance hall, and gained entrance by paying 25 cents, which fee admitted him to the dance hall with the privileges of a spectator. Immediately following him was Gerald Wolfe, but the agent of the management of the dance hall, who was stationed at the door, denied admission to Wolfe, he avers, without giving reasons.

Wolfe returned a second time, he said, during the same evening, but this time accompanied by his sister, Mrs. T. C. Fair, as his dance partner, but was met at the door by two representatives of the dance hall management, he claims, with "coats off and sleeves rolled up ready for a fight." Wolfe asserts that he was assaulted by the two men first, before he engaged them in a fight, whereupon his friend, Wilbur Smith, assisted him, and says he believes that the agents of the dance hall were beaten up.

**Wolfe Is War Veteran.** Wolfe claims that he is a veteran of the world war, and has taken advantage of the homestead act benefitting returned soldiers by taking up a homestead near Gates. He claims that the managers of the dance hall, because he filed on land which they wanted, are jealous of him and have repeatedly annoyed him and antagonized him.

Smith and Wolfe seek a dismissal of the suit, costs and disbursements of the suit, and a judgment against the plaintiff for \$20,000, which sum the defendants claim represent the damage suffered by their reputations.

**Lower Freight Rate is Possible for Material**

For the benefit of the state highway commission, the public service commission has taken up with H. E. Lounsbury, general

freight agent for the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, the proposal of allowing a reduction of 10 cents a ton less than the published freight rates on sand, gravel and crushed rock moving over the lines of that company as bona fide shipments for government, state or county highway construction.

The service commission has advised the highway board of this action in a letter which says: "The matter of rates after September 1, 1920, is still under consideration by the railroad company, and you will be advised later as to what will be done in the matter."

**Automobiles by Counties Are Shown by Mr. Kozer**

From January 1 to July 31, this year, a total of 94,770 motor vehicles were registered in the state, according to a statement made public yesterday by Sam A. Kozer, secretary of state. The aggregated \$1,829,429 in license fees, Mr. Kozer's statement, showing the number of motor vehicles registered from each county and the amount of license fees paid from each, follows:

Marion county has 6952 automobiles and pays license fees on them of \$118,325.

Polk county has 1923 motor vehicles and the license fees are \$35,487.50.

**Talk of Recalling Court Is Heard in Polk County**

S. Benson, chairman of the state highway commission, said here yesterday that there is some talk in Polk county of recalling the county court because of its highway policy in refusing the grade the Salem-Dallas highway so the commission may proceed with paving.

The refusal of the court to grade the highway is because of the determination to build the west side Pacific highway according to a route not touching Dallas and Independence. Mr. Benson says that an agreement was made with the former county administration that the commission would pave the Salem-Dallas road in return for being extended the privilege of building the west side road as it might see fit. County Judge Robinson, he says, has refused to live up to this agreement.

"When the court comes ahead with the grading," said Mr. Benson, "the commission will be glad to proceed with the paving."
