Big Hotel for Gearhart

Planned by Portlanders

Portland men of wealth are behind a move to establish a first class hotel and natatorium at Gearhart. Articles of incorporation were filed at the office of T. B. Handley, state corporation commissioner, showing the capitalization of the company to be \$400,000. The incorporators are J. C. Ainsworth, Emery Olmstead, C. F. Adams, R. B. Wilcox, M. H. Houser, Julius Meier, H. M. Covey and T. D. Honeyman.

Articles of incorporation have been filed by the Ross Building company of Portland, capitalized at \$10,000. The incorporators are George A. Ross, Erma Ross and L. W. Matthews.

A permit to operate in Oregon has been issued to Colorado Valley and Power company, a Delaware corporation, having 50,000 shares of stock. N. D. Simon of Portland is attorney-in-fact for Oregon.

LOS ANGELES MAN BUYS HOME

Sanderson Likes Climate and Will Stay—Nearly All States Represented

Salem's dearth of houses for rent, combined with the opportunities discernible to experienced property owners, led T. A. Sanderson of Los Angeles to purchase a home in Salem yesterday afternoon, according to T. G. Albert, superintendent of Salem's automobile camping grounds.

According to Mr. Albert, the Los Angeles man, who purchased the Wilson home at North Cottage and Market streets, was enamored with the climate here and had made a decision to spend the winter here, but when he discovered that he could not lease an apartment or a suitable home for his family, he purchased a house and will now make Salem his permanent home. He informed Mr. Albert that Salem and vicinity looked good to him.

W. L. Bryant, the night patrolman on duty at the camping grounds, has compiled the total registrations on record at the grounds. By his report, 1573 cars have driven under the archway into the grounds bringing Salem's guests. Cars that have come solely for picnics and other day gatherings, but registered, were not considered.
