

# GREATEST FAIR IS ON SCHEDULE

Particular Emphasis Placed by Board on Exhibits of Livestock

If advance indications are worth anything at all as a basis of calculation the coming state fair will see the largest and best exhibits of live stock that have ever been seen at these grounds

or anywhere else in the north-west. The large premiums offered by the state fair board, supplemented by the special premiums offered by several of the registry associations, combine to form a big incentive for more breeders to enter the lists with exhibition herds, also to stimulate more interest everywhere in Oregon for more pure bred stock.

**Entries Not Closed.** While the entries in these lists will not close until September 20, and usually the possible entries to be expected do not show up far in advance of the closing time, this year the exhibitors are calling for space in such numbers and with

such important herds as to leave no doubt of the magnitude and extra quality of the exhibits. Many exhibitors entirely new to the fair are already entered and preparing to come. Among these are L. A. Bowes & Co., of Calgary, Canada, with a fine herd of Short-horns; Cecil M. Hayden, of Aloca, Ore., with a herd of Ayrshires; J. R. Malen of Canary, Ore., also a herd of Ayrshires; O. L. Kissick, Tacoma, hogs; S. D. Steffy, Newberg, Ore., hogs; R. E. Cherrick, Barlow, Ore., hogs; Tyler Brothers, Eugene, hogs; Clay Daniel of Mohler, Ore., is coming with a carload of Holsteins from that part of Tillamook county. This is the first year there has

been a rabbit department, and at this writing there is promise of at least 500 entries of exhibition rabbits. Mr. Shearer, superintendent of the poultry department will also be superintendent of the rabbit department. The poultry department has come to be one of the largest departments at the fair and this year will see another fine display of birds. Arrangements have been made whereby the entries in the poultry and rabbit departments will be fed by the state fair board.

**Prominent Breeders for Judges.** The judges for the livestock departments have been secured, and are among the prominent men who make stock raising a business. C. W. Campbell, Manhattan, Kan., will judge the beef breeds, H. W. Griswold, West Salem, Wis., will judge the Guernseys and Jerseys, also some other dairy classes. John L. Smith, Spokane will judge the Holsteins and Ayrshires also some other dairy classes. Hugh Walters of Townsend, Mont., will judge the swine. Charles Talmadge, Salem, will also judge the swine. James G. Fuller, Madison Wis., will judge the draft horses. Robert Miller, Davis, Cal., sheep and goats. George Wells of Oskosh, Wis., will judge the poultry. J. D. Inlow of Portland will judge the rabbits.

**All Departments Filled.** The agricultural department is going to be the finest ever this year. A great number of counties have signified their intention of exhibiting and it is going to be a question as to whether or not there is sufficient room to house all the exhibits in this department. The Oregon manufacturers' department, located on the second floor of the new pavilion, is filled to overflowing and it will be necessary to house some of these exhibits in the educational building.

In the educational building will be located all the state institutions and they are already making preparations to place in a better and larger exhibit than ever before. The floral department will be housed in the center aisle of the new pavilion this year and will prove to be an added attraction to this building.

In the art and textile departments the exhibits will be fine. Sports in the Stadium. The new stadium will be the scene of the stock judging during the daytime, and in the evening will be used for interesting contests in horse riding and driving, while an additional sport this year will be auto polo, which is very exciting.

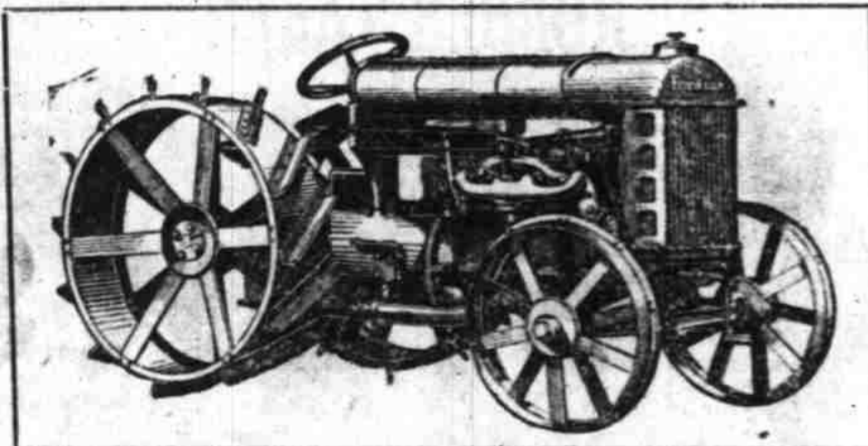

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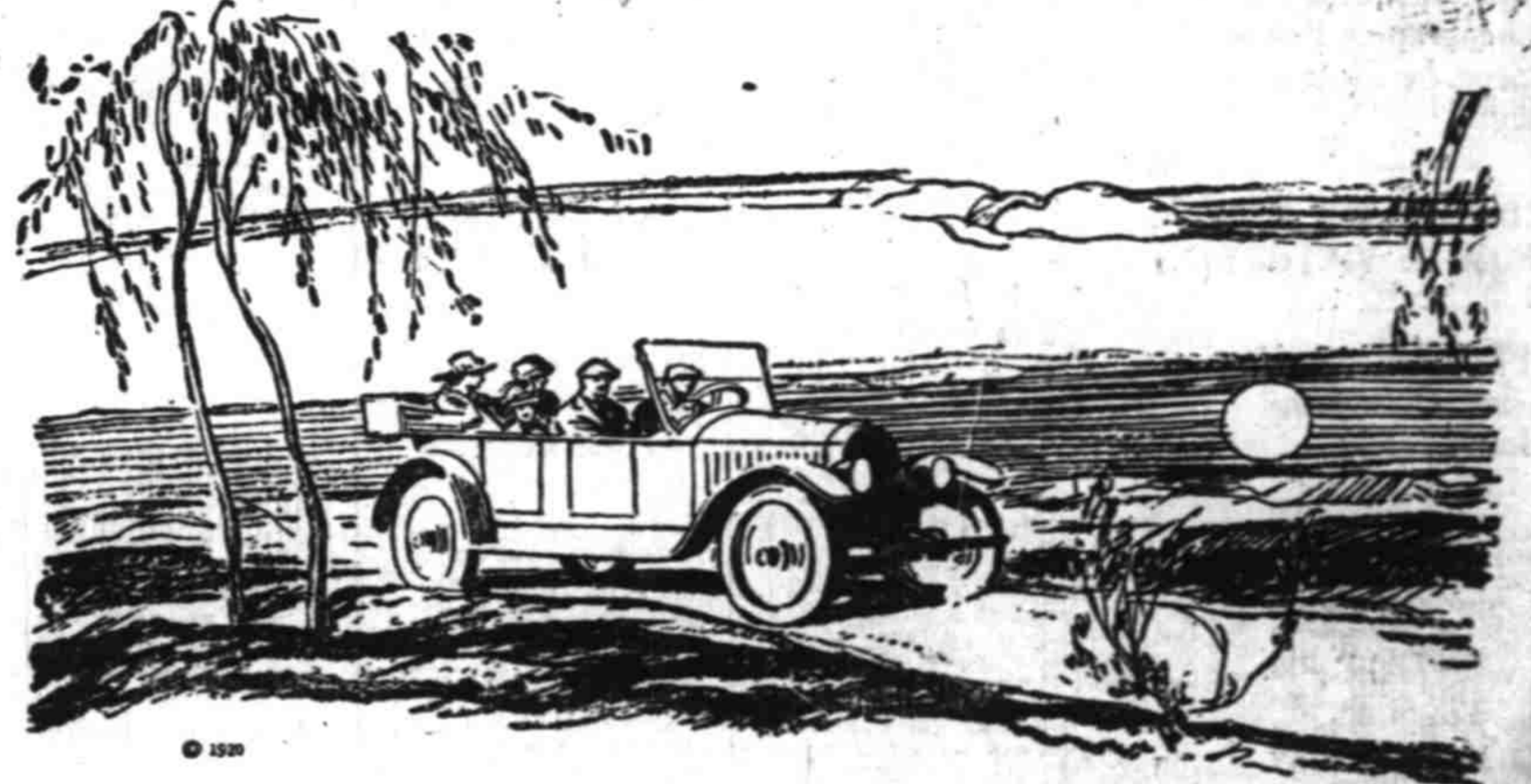
