Capital Increased.—Notification of an increase in capitalization from \$45,000 to \$300,000 was filed with the state corporation commissioner yesterday by the Coast Culvert & Plume company of Portland. The Steelcraft corporation of America, a Delaware concern, capitalized at \$3,000,000 was issued a permit to sell 5000 shares of preferred stock and 5000 shares of common stock in Oregon. Dubinsky & Co., of Portland are the Oregon representatives and George Alexander of Portland is attorney-in-fact for Oregon. Articles of incorporation were filed by the Redmond Junior Manufacturing company of Redmond. The company is capitalized at \$10,000. The incorporators are W. C. Van Cleve, William Wilson and Guy E. Dobson.

Too Fast, Says Welch.—J. T. Welch, Salem chief of police, believes the 25 miles an hour speed limit allowed for automobiles in the Salem residence district if the 15 miles allowed in the fire limits is too fast and favors cutting down the speed at which motorists are allowed to go. Twenty-five miles, Welch says, means 30 miles, because five miles must be allowed the driver of a car as a margin in case of an argument with an officer.

Ringle Files Discharge.—Phillip H. Ringle filed his discharge from the United States army at the county clerk's office yesterday. According to his discharge he participated in several important drives while with the A. E. F. in France. On August 7 to 24, 1918, he took part in the defensive flight on the Sauerland sector in the St. Mihiel offensive between the dates of September 12 and 13, 1918; and later he took part in the Meuse-Argonne offensive of October 1 to 12, 1918. He was with the offensive army of the second Meuse-Argonne offensive of November 5 to 8, 1918, and at the Aisne-Marne offensive of July 18 to 22, 1918. Ringle enlisted in Salem on March 28, 1917, and was discharged as a corporal at Camp Lewis on September 27, 1919. Mr. Ringle did not receive a wound while with the A. E. F.

Convenience Would Put Salem Camp Ground Ahead of All, Say Campers

Under the limited financial support extended to the Salem automobile camping ground established some months ago by the Salem Commercial club, the ground is as near complete as possible. The ground is equipped with an adequate number of brick bunks which accommodate all who may register during any one night. The ovens are of such proportions that several families can prepare food on one oven.

The office of the superintendent which for some time was a mere box of rough structure, now has the proportions of a neat office, equipped with road maps covering the highways of the northwest, and with literature of Oregon and Marion county. Mr. Albert says that the motorists who spend the night at the grounds as the guests of Salem, express great delight over the matter contained in the Marion county community federation booklets. He says the booklet contains information that many of the tourists are seeking.

Time and again, says Mr. Albert, automobile travelers who spend the night at the ground and who have visited noteworthy automobile camps of the country, say that should showers be installed on the Salem grounds, its supremacy over leading camping parks of Montana and the northwest would be established beyond doubt.
