SCENERY POLICY HAS APPROVAL

Crown-Willamette Company for it, but Would Ask State for Pay

Governor Olcott is in receipt of a letter from William Pierce Johnson, president of the Crown-Willamette Paper company, in which Mr. Johnson says his company is in accord with the governor's policy to preserve the forests that border tourist highways of the state, and that he will take up with the timber department of the company the feasibility of following the governor's suggestion relative to the road from Seaside to Cannon Beach.

To reserve the forests along the highways, however, would be a considerable monetary loss, Mr. Johnson says and he thinks an adjustment should be made whereby this loss would be borne by the state.

From George R. Taitt of Portland the governor has received a letter in which Mr. Taitt concurs with the governor's policy. He suggests that where the timber is owned by private interests, thorough cruise by forest guards should be made for a distance of a quarter of a mile on each side of the highway to determine the quality and quantity of the timber. He would have the stumpage value per thousand feet determined, and then have the state purchase, if possible, but if not possible, legislate on an equitable basis an enactment that will give the state power to protect its natural forest growth so the beauty of the highways will not be marred.

Col. E. Hofer of Salem has written a letter congratulating the governor on the stand he has taken.

FRUIT COMPANY IS FORMED HERE

Articles Filed at Capitol—Main Operations to be at Forest Grove

Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday at the office of T. B. Handley, state corporation commissioner, by the Western Fruit company, which will have its main offices at Salem. The capitalization is \$10,000 and the incorporators are J. Howard Zinser, M. J. Spalding and Ariel D. Zinser. The new company will dry, evaporate, preserve and pack fruits and vegetables. It is said the operations of the concern will be mainly in the Forest Grove section.

Articles were filed by the Anchor Investment company of Portland, capitalized at \$5000. The incorporators are Frank Motter, Frank M. Barrett and Zeno P. Richards.

Resolutions showing an increase in capitalization from \$25,000 to \$50,000 were filed by G. A. Ger-ritsen & Co., Inc., of Portland.

Southern Pacific Agrees to Reduction in Rates

The Southern Pacific company has agreed to a reduction of 10 per cent on freight shipments of road building materials consigned to the state, counties or other municipalities, according to a letter received by the public service commission from Ben C. Dey, attorney for the railroad company. This is conditioned on bona fide shipments on which the freight is paid by the state or the municipality to which the shipment is consigned.

Meyers Forms Association with Manufacturing Firm

Henry W. Meyers has become associated with the Ellis-Peschau company of Seattle, manufacturers of women's garments and felt goods, the latter including such articles as pennants, banners and pillows. The concern is said to be a growing one. Mr. Meyers has an office with Mangis Bros. He was of the firm of H. W. & M. L. Meyers, which some months ago sold the department store at Court and Liberty streets to the Miller Mercantile company.

Hauser is Appointed to Succeed Henry W. Meyers

E. V. Hauser was yesterday appointed by Governor Olcott to serve on the committee of fifteen members appointed to study the operation of the workmen's compensation act and the state industrial accident commission which administers the act, to make recommendations for alterations to the next legislature if it is found that changes in the law are needed.

Mr. Hauser is appointed to succeed Henry W. Meyers of Salem, who was named a few days ago to succeed Del A. Dinsmore. Mr. Meyers found he could not give the necessary time to the work. Mr. Hauser will be one of the representatives for the state at large on the committee, of whom there are five. Also there are five representing the employers' and five the employees.

SCHOOLS TO GET SAFETY COURSE

State Departments Collaborate in Plan Soon to be Adopted in Oregon

The state educational department, labor department, the forestry department and the state industrial accident commission will collaborate in maintaining a course in accident prevention, fire prevention and public and industrial safety in the schools of Oregon.

The plan was decided upon at a conference yesterday in the office of J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, attended by W. A. Marshall and Will T. Kirk of the industrial accident commission, C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, Mr. Churchill, B. C. Hall of Portland, Oregon representative of the National Safety council, and Hugh Herdman, former school man of Portland.

Herdman was named as chairman of a committee which will write a course of study for the Oregon schools. The course will be published and distributed by Superintendent Churchill and become a part of the regular school course of the state in the department of civics.

In the conference it was brought out that only one-fourth of accidents prevented are due to safety appliances. The other three-fourths are due to education.

City of Scio to Develop Power from Thomas Creek

The city of Scio has made a re-filling with the state engineering department covering the proposed appropriation of 47 second feet of water from the Thomas creek for power development. Owing to changes in the location of the proposed dam it is found necessary to make the new filling. The development contemplated includes the building of a rubble masonry dam and flume at an estimated cost of \$38,000.

ing the appropriation of water from spring for domestic use and the irrigation of a small tract in Union county.

By H. W. Laughlin of North Powder, covering the storage of water in the Anthony lake reservoir for irrigation purposes.

By W. E. Chamberlain of Portland, covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed spring for irrigation of a small tract in Multnomah county.

By John Lawrence of Hood river, covering the appropriation of water from all creek for irrigation of a small tract in Hood River county.

Independence Brothers Arrested for Gambling

DALLAS, Or., Aug. 24.—(Special to The Statesman)—Sheriff John W. Orr made a surprise trip to Independence Wednesday night and arrested the Smith brothers, proprietors of a pool room in that city, on a charge of allowing gambling in their place of business. Six occupants of the room who are alleged to have been gambling at a table were also taken into custody by Sheriff Orr and held before Justice of the Peace Baker of that city where they pleaded guilty and were fined \$10 each.

The Smith brothers were arrested about five years ago on a gambling charge and in a trial before Judge Belt of the circuit court found guilty and fined \$500 for the offense. It is likely that the grand jury that sits in the next term of court will have a case against the men to contend with.

Polk County Fires Are Nearly All Burned Out

DALLAS, Or., Aug. 26.—(Special to The Statesman)—Forest fires in the western part of Polk county which have been burning for the past week are about burned out and are under the control of the fire fighters.

The big fire on the Luckiamute river which burned fiercely last week and for a time threatened to take a large amount of standing timber was finally controlled Sunday and is now beyond the danger point. The fire did some damage to green timber, but was stopped before it had made much headway.

Fire Warden W. V. Fuller says the loss from forest fires this season has been unusually small due mostly to the efficiency of the patrolmen and the lookouts who have been constantly on the job since early in June.
