PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 27.—Numerous newly enfranchised Allegheny county women yesterday were defrauded by a bogus tax collector, who went into action shortly after Secretary Colby had signed the proclamation declaring woman suffrage law. The swindler appeared at their homes, informed them that they must pay a poll tax if they wanted to vote in November, collected the money, and handing out a receipt, disappeared.

PLAN COAST CAMPAIGN.

SEATTLE, Aug. 27.—Tentative plans for opening the national campaign in Washington were formed today at a conference by Elmer Dover, Republican campaign manager for the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona, with Guy E. Kelly, national committeeman, and Sam A. Walker, state chairman. It was announced that Senator Hiram W. Johnson will make at least two speeches in the state and Herbert Hoover and former United States Senator Albert J. Beveridge will also be invited to speak here.

Portland Firm Sells Cane Sugar at 20 Cents

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 27.—For the first time in many months sugar sold in Portland today for 20 cents a pound, one firm selling the sweet product at five pounds for \$1. Other establishments were advertising sugar at 21 cents a pound.

Federal Agents Charged With Aiding Law Breakers

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Warrants for seven men were issued and three federal prohibition agents were suspended today as the start of an investigation into alleged conspiracies between federal agents and wholesale whiskey dealers to evade the prohibition enforcement law.

Sales Girls Burned in Store by Sinn Feiners

DUNDALK, Ireland, Aug. 27.—Two sales girls and one salesman were burned to death in stores of two Protestant unionist tradesmen in Dundalk early today. The buildings were set on fire. The homes of the owners of the stores were burned.

Government Will Sell Fleet of Steel Vessels

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Sale of the government owned fleet of steel vessels, for which bids will be opened September 1 will be confined to craft not in service on established steamship lines, it was stated tonight by shipping board officials. Vessels operating in berth service will not be sold except to purchasers who agree to keep them in their established routes, nor will ships at sea for which commitments have been made, be disposed of unless substitutes can be provided for their operators.

AGED PIONEER DEAD.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 27.—Mrs. Aylina Manning, a pioneer of the Ox-cart travelers to California in 1849, died at her home here last night, aged 79 years. Mrs. Manning was 8 years old when she reached the Sacramento valley in California and the "gold rush" was just beginning. Mrs. Manning had been a resident of Washington since 1877.

INFANTRY WINS FIRST.

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 27.—The United States infantry team landed first place in the national rifle team match, finished today, with a score of 3,421 over the 200 yard rapid fire, the 600 slow fire and the 1,000 yard slow fire ranges. The United States navy

team took second, with 3,395. The United States marine corps team was third with 3,300.

PITTSBURGH ARCHERS WIN

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 27.—The Keystone archers of Pittsburgh, Pa., won the team shoot at the concluding day of the 40th annual tournament of the National Archery association at Wayne, Pa., today with a total score of 1268. The Wayne archers were second, third and fourth, respectively.

REDS GAIN IN PERSIA.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Resit was recaptured when heavy Bolshevik reinforcements which had landed at Enzeli from Baku Wednesday, drove back the Persian Cossacks, says the Teheran correspondent of the London Times. The Cossacks are reported to be retreating along the Resit-Kahavin road.

Crowd Handles Affair

Senator Harding endorses the plan of quotas and states his knowledge of the facts, said Governor Cox, reading from the Republican literature "that the organization is to cover every state and every county. Then he states that he knows nothing about it and that Hays and Upham are running the campaign. I am disposed to agree with him. There are many things being done now by the crowd surrounding Senator Harding, of which he is ignorant apparently and if he should become president, many other things would be done by the crowd and he would not know anything more about them than he says he does about the contributions."

Bulletin Goes to Crowd

His copies, the governor said, humorously, were "mysterious messengers of good tidings that came to me from a very strange source and were intended to get into my hands nor yours." Attacking the alleged secrecy imposed upon recipients of the "Bulletin" Governor Cox said that some idea of probable contributions could be gained when it was considered that there are 10,000,000 postoffices in the country and that the quota list totaled \$8,145,000 for only 51 cities.

Question One of Honesty

The contribution question, the candidate declared, is a matter of "plain, national honesty and decency." No small group of men having millions and millions behind them should be permitted to get a government underhold," said the governor. Governor Cox urged the election to the senate of Homer S. Lumber Employees Accept Lower Wage

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 27.—Employees of the Coos Bay lumber mills have agreed to accept a reduction of 50 cents a day in their present wage scale, it became known here today. The reduction was agreed upon at a meeting of the wage committee of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen and mill operators. The operators explained that they would have to close entirely under existing market conditions or reduce the present wage scale and the committee agreed to accept the reduction, a provision being made that the 50 cent decrease should be again be placed upon their pay checks when the price of lumber advanced. The present minimum wage is \$5.39, the new scale, which will go into effect September 1 calling for a minimum of \$4.89.

NORTH BEND, Or., Aug. 27.—

The North Bend Mill & Lumber company issued a letter to their employees following the announcement by other mills on Coos Bay, declaring that the company would not reduce their current pay at least during September. The letter sets out that the lumber situation is not bright but that the company will maintain the present schedule as long as it is no worse.

Argentina Socialists Would Aid Bolsheviks

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 27.—Following a mass meeting held last night by laborers under the auspices of the Socialist party, a telegram was sent to the council of action of the British labor party, stating that Argentine laborers were resolved "to adhere to the Russian revolution and to support the workers of Europe and America for the defeat of reactionary capitalism. They opposed all aid to governments which maintain the Russian blockade or make war against Russia."

WILL RELEASE GOLD.

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 27.—

Foreign Minister Salaberry announced today he would soon release \$23,000,000 which is held in the United States to the credit of the account of the Argentine embassy in Washington. The decree releasing the gold is expected Saturday and is presumed it will have the effect of reducing the heavy discount on the Argentine pesos in the United States.
