Of the total number of accidents reported 465 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 12 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act and 29 were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.

Answer Filed in Test Case From Lake County

The attorney general's office is preparing an answer to the complaint of the Lake County Land & Livestock company in a test case to determine title to the beds of lakes in that county. The company owns many acres of lands adjacent to the lake and claims the lakelands. The state takes the position that these are swamp lands and that title therefore is in the state.

The action was filed in the circuit court for Lake county.
