Because deputies in the office of the county assessor confused "trees" with "acres" in the report on the agricultural and horticultural survey of the county, some serious errors occurred in the tabulation which was published in The Statesman of last Friday morning.
The corrected report shows that 144,328 acres are devoted to grain and field crops in Marion county, while 20,746 acres are devoted to fruits. It is shown in the report that Marion county has 4615 farms. The acreage devoted to all kinds of farming is 329,667.
