Sunday Program to Include Sports at Fair Grounds and Sacred Concert

According to Salem representatives of the order, delegates will arrive in the city Saturday night. The business sessions will not be held until Monday morning.

According to a tentative program announced last night, Sunday is to be gala day with the Artisans. Next Sunday the delegates are to indulge in a basket picnic at the state fair grounds, supplemented by games and races in the stadium. Suitable prizes are to be awarded to successful contestants.

The activities of the Artisans for Sunday will shift to Willson park in the evening where a sacred concert will be given in the evening at 9 o'clock. Big Loss Threatened by Fire at Silverton

SILVERTON, Or., Aug. 30.—A fire starting in the sawdust pile by the abandoned mill on the tract of timber south of town belonging to Tegland & Larsen, came near resulting in a serious loss yesterday. The fire gained strength rapidly in the tall grass and dry slashings and it was only by heroic work on the part of a fire fighters that the standing timber and the slaughter house were saved. L. H. Meyer lost about 500 feet of lumber. Two carloads of 16-inch wood were burned. The frame work of the sawmill was also destroyed.

About 20 men in the district promptly answered the fire call, saving Tegland & Larsen from a more serious loss.

The mill machinery was moved about two weeks ago to another timber tract on the Abiqua.
