

LEGISLATORS RETURN TO POST

Filibustering Tennesseans Back but Quorum Lacking

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 30.—The Tennessee house of representatives, though reinforced by the presence of the 35 filibustering members who have been in Alabama for more than a week, failed by two votes to have a quorum of 66 this afternoon when it reconvened. Adjournment was finally taken until tomorrow.

The lack of the quorum was due to the absence of several suffrage members who were unable to reach Nashville this afternoon. Their associates, finding themselves in the minority, refused to fill the quorum for fear that the opponents of ratification of the suffrage amendment might attempt to nullify the action of ten days ago when the ratification resolution was adopted.

Building Man Gets Three Cheers at Club Meeting

F. Jordan, who has located in Salem to go into the house building business, was the principal speaker at the noon luncheon of the Commercial club yesterday. He told members that some persons had attempted to discourage him in his determination to locate here, but that he had faith in Salem and would locate here and begin building houses nevertheless. McCroskey announced that because next Monday is Labor day there will be no noon luncheon.

ANTI-REDS COMBINE

Sovinkoff Announces Complete Recognition of Wrangle

PARIS, Aug. 30.—General Boris Savinkoff, the noted anti-Bolshevik leader, has announced his complete recognition of General Wrangle's government in southern Russia and his intention to give General Wrangle his support, according to advices from Warsaw today.

The Russian divisions which are fighting with the Poles will join General Wrangle's forces and be entirely under his command, the advices add.

General Savinkoff is an old revolutionary Socialist, who was prominently identified with Kerensky's regime. When the Bolsheviks assumed control in Russia he came to Paris. Recently General Savinkoff left for Warsaw, where he has been aiding the Poles in their fight against the soviet forces.

New Boys' Secretary Arrives From Seattle

Lyman Prickett of Seattle, newly appointed boys' secretary at the local Y. M. C. A., is in Salem and will take up his regular duties September 1. At present he is becoming acquainted with the boys and getting a line on the work in general.

Mr. Prickett's work will be to organize the boys into a real live branch of the Young Men's Christian association. The organization will have regular meetings, its own officers and cabinet and will carry on the usual work among the boys and young men of the city.

St. Louis Mob Gathers Prisoners Removed

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 30.—Two of the three men held in connection with the slaying early today of two police officers of Clayton, ten miles west of here, were removed from the jail at Clayton tonight when a mob of 500 persons gathered in the court house square and a warning reached Sheriff Bopp of St. Louis county that an attempt was to be made to storm the jail and lynch the prisoners. The men were taken to St. Louis.

Shortly after it became known that the men had been spirited away, the mob disbanded. Sheriff

Bopp, with the prisoners under guard, reached St. Louis safely.

The prisoners, George H. Parr, 20 and David Burke, 25, together with Willis Anthony, 26, were arrested in connection with the shooting to death of Eugene S. Conroy and Benjamin Corner, night sheriff and city marshal, respectively, early today. The police officers attempted to place the three men, whom they suspected of being highwaymen, under arrest, a revolver battle ensuing. In the exchange of shots Conroy was shot and instantly killed and Corner was shot, dying shortly afterwards. Anthony was seriously wounded.

Umatilla Man's Estate Valuation Is Increased

Because of a revision in the appraisalment of the estate of the late Robert Laing of Umatilla insisted upon by O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, the valuation placed upon the estate has been increased by \$33,600 and the inheritance tax increased accordingly. The total valuation of the estate is now placed at \$94,874 and the inheritance tax paid the state is \$13,962.29.

All Marion County to Caport at Picnic Soon

All Marion county is to join in a picnic at Spon's landing Sunday, September 13, to be held under the auspices of the Marion County Community federation. The federation is made up of community clubs from all the important towns of the county. It is planned to make the picnic an annual affair.

Day Set Apart for Salem at Linn County's Fair

Salem day at the Linn county fair will be Wednesday, October 6, according to information received by the Salem Commercial club from W. F. Gilstrap, manager of the Albany Commercial club. All Salem is invited, and Mr. Gilstrap's letter says bands, uniformed organizations or any other kind of organizations will be welcome.

Woman Hotel Keeper Sells Liquor to Patrons

YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 30.—Sheriff Samuel Hutchinson and deputies tonight raided an alleged road house near the state fair grounds; arrested Mrs. Gene White, who is charged with conducting the resort; smashed nearly 20 cases of liquor and completely wrecked the place to prevent its further use.

NEW RUSS GENERAL NAMED

HARBIN, Aug. 29.—General Semenoff who succeeded General Kolchak as head of the all-Russian government, has, according to reports current here, started the organization of a green army, with which to supporting the reported insurrection of peasant in western Siberia against the soviet government.

General Semenoff was expected shortly in Dauri with an army of former Kolchak soldiers, consisting of cosack and former Ural factory workmen.

The reported insurrection in western Siberia, the reports states, was headed by General Sperbakhoff, formerly of the Russian general staff.

BRITISH SHIPPING TIED UP

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—British shipping continued to be tied up to some extent as the result of the failure to report to work of many longshoremen, who walked out in sympathy with the Irish freedom movement last Friday. Union leaders asserted efforts to induce the men to return to work had failed, and estimated that about 4000 were out.

LEAGUE HELD RESPONSIBLE

Japanese Premier Avers League Causes Even More Friction

TOKIO, Aug. 29.—Considering conditions as a whole there is nothing warranting extreme pessimism in Japan's economic outlook and matters will right themselves in the course of time, according to the opinion expressed by Premier Hara, addressing the Seiyu-Kai (constitutionalist) party here.

Turning his attention to politics the premier said that the league of nations has been brought into existence but instead of making the world live in peace following the great war that it seemed to have accentuated international friction. The economic competition among nations "under such circumstances will not be easy for Japan, as one of the five great powers, to maintain its prestige or promote its national fortunes," he said. Japan has made some great strides since the opening of this country 50 years ago, but it should not remain satisfied with small success, he declared.

CAROLINA PRIMARY TODAY

COLUMBUS, S. C., Aug. 30.—South Carolina Democrats will hold a primary tomorrow to nominate a United States senator, seven representatives in congress and all state officers, including governor. Nomination in the primary is considered equivalent to election.

Senator E. D. Smith is opposed for renomination by former Senator W. P. Pollock, George Warren of Hampton, and W. C. Irby of Laurens.

Governor Cooper is a candidate for renomination without opposition.

ORIENTALS TO ORGANIZE

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 30.—Prominent Japanese, Chinese and Koreans met with Alexander Ford of Honolulu, editor of the Mid-Pacific Magazine during the visit of the American congressional party to Seoul, and agreed to organize a branch of the pan-Pacific union.

MAC SWEENEY NEAR DEATH

LONDON, Aug. 30.—At midnight Terence MacSweeney was still alive. He was conscious but unable to speak.

SARAH BERNHARDT ILL

PARIS, Aug. 30.—Sarah Bernhardt, the actress, is suffering from a congestion of the lungs and inflammation of the kidneys and is confined to her bed. The attending physicians are not apprehensive of serious developments.

PEKING CONFERS DEGREE

PEKING, Aug. 29.—Peking University has conferred the de-

gree of doctor of laws upon Dr. Paul S. Reinsch, former United States minister to China, and also conferred the degree of doctor of philosophy upon Professor John F. Dewey, Columbia University exchange professor at Peking University.

EXTRADITION HONORED

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 30.—Governor Henry J. Allen today honored the extradition issued by the governor of Texas for the return of J. W. Lowman, an evangelist wanted at Ft Worth for theft of a motor car and indicted there in connection with the killing of Kerschel Erwin.

RUMANIA CABINET QUILTS

PARIS, Aug. 30.—The resignation of the Rumanian cabinet headed by Premier Averesco, is announced in Berlin dispatches.

FISH PACK VERY LARGE

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 30.—With the close of the spring fishing season on the lower Columbia river it was found that the pack had averaged well within that of former years and exceeds that of 1919 by from 10 to 15 per cent. The pack of first grade chinooks was exceptionally large. Plants cured 27,540,500 pounds of raw fish having a total value of \$6,719,300, the bulk of this huge sum to be brought into Oregon from the east and foreign lands.

DESCHUTES CROPS GOOD

BEND, Or., Aug. 30.—Deschutes county is due to have a bumper year if present indications hold good. Plantings of alfalfa have increased by 200 acres and sunflowers, 500 acres. In many instances the first crop of alfalfa

exceeds the total crop harvested last year and the potato acreage, though slightly decreased, promises an excellent yield.

ERECT MILL ON ROCK CREEK

BANDON, Or., Aug. 30.—One of the finest stands of white cedar on the coast is soon to be logged by G. M. Willoughby & Son, who have just procured machinery for operating a logging camp and saw mill in the Rock creek district. They have a tract containing 6,000,000 feet of timber.
