State and Gravel Company Make Five-Year Contract

The state land board yesterday entered into a contract with the Salem Sand & Gravel company whereby the latter agrees to pay the state a royalty of 10 cents a cubic yard for gravel extracted from the bed of the Willamette river. The contract covers a period of five years and 500,000 yards of gravel a year is required by the state as a minimum.

This company has been in litigation with the board, contending that under the law its bid of 3 cents a yard as royalty should be accepted for the reason that it was the highest bid submitted. The board rejected the bid and won in court.

McNary Finds Irrigation Does Wonders in Klamath

Irrigation has done wonders for Klamath county and will do much here, according to United States Senator Charles I. McNary, who has returned to Salem after a jaunt through that section of the state with citizens of Klamath Falls.

"In Klamath county," said Senator McNary, "I went over the irrigation projects and was happily surprised to see the extent to which irrigation has been applied to the country. I saw wonderful crops of grain, alfalfa and other hay, particularly in that part of the county which is tributary to the recession of Tule lake. I saw the Skyline reservoir, which if it is completed by the government, will practically double the irrigation land in that section. The country is prospering."

PRISONERS TO BE RELEASED

Order Asks Compton to Free I. W. W. Pending Appeal to High Court

Warden Compton of the state penitentiary yesterday received a court order from Judge Tazwell of Portland for the release, under bonds of \$2000 each, of Joe Laundry and Carl W. Oster, both convicted under the criminal syndicalism act because of their activities as members of the I. W. W., and both sentenced to serve terms in the state prison, Laundry for two years and Oster for five years. Presumably the release is pending action in the supreme court. Laundry filed his appeal to the supreme court and it is understood Oster will do likewise.

Warden Compton and Governor Olcott referred Judge Tazwell's order to the attorney general's office, where it was found that the procedure is legal. However, defects were found in the form of the order and Walter H. Evans, Multnomah county district attorney, said in a telephone conversation that he will cause a corrected order to be issued. Armour & Company yesterday filed with the state corporation commissioner resolutions showing an increase in capitalization from \$210,000,000 to \$400,000,000.

Resolutions of increase have been filed by the W. Rogers Hotel company of Portland, the increase being from \$3,000 to \$10,000.

Permits to Sell Oil Stock Issued in State

T. B. Handley, state corporation commissioner, yesterday issued permits to sell stock in Oregon to one Texas and one Oregon oil company. The Texas concern is the Mogul Producing & Refining company which will be allowed to sell \$100,000 worth of stock in this state. The Oregon company is the Trigon Oil company of Medford, which will sell 50,000 shares of stock in Oregon. A permit to sell 20,000 shares was issued to the Automatic Electric brake company of Roseburg and a permit to sell \$5000 worth of stock was issued to the Dundee Fruit Growers & Packers of Dundee.
