Service Commission May Remove Unjust Imposts

Under the public utility act it is incumbent upon the Oregon public service commission to call a hearing in response to a petition of Portland citizens to determine whether imposts assessed against the street car system of the Portland Railway, Light and Power company are unreasonable and unjust, declares an opinion issued Saturday by J. O. Bailey, assistant attorney general. The opinion is written to the service commission.

The petition was filed with the commission several weeks ago by F. D. Loderick, B. N. Fisher and V. Chadek, representing Portland car riders, who take the stand that if the particular burden of taxation referred to in the petition can be removed it will be possible to reduce the street car fare which several months ago was increased to 8 cents by an order of the commission.

The garden referred to are franchise taxes, car licenses, free transportation of city employees, paving assessments and bridge rentals. Bailey holds that if a hearing before the service commission determines that the burdens are unreasonable, under the utility act they become void to the extent of their unreasonableness and should be removed.

Journalism Classes Dropped at Berkeley

BERKELEY, Cal., Sept. 4.—Journalism classes at the University of California were suspended because the fall semester opened, because it was announced, of the need for strict economy and the inability of the university to obtain experienced instructors. Students requesting journalism instruction are being referred to one course in the English department. This class, it is expected, will be the nucleus for later development of journalism work.

Astoria is Choice of Convention for Meeting Place Next Year

LIBERTY TEAM WINNER

Plea for Spirit of Brotherhood Made by Grand Master Hutchins

"Whenever we lose the spirit of brotherhood, we lose the heart of the world," said H. S. Hutchins, grand master of the United Artisans, in his address at the armory yesterday morning. "The spirit of brotherhood permeates all human endeavor, and when that fails, our activities will be rewarded with failure."

"What is there in it for me?" Mr. Hutchins said is the question that many people ask when confronted with some task. "Too many of us ask that question of ourselves when we are asked to do something. We have no thought of the good that our service may bring to others. This spirit of selfishness is at the bottom of many of our present ills of unrest and indifference. We are uneasy because we are unable to observe any tangible and material returns from our efforts. We are too selfish."

Americans Held Too Harsh

It is the opinion of Mr. Hutchins that the American people criticize too much, are too eager to find fault with the city government, with state institutions and with the national government. He exhorted those who find fault with assemblies of the Artisans. He suggested less petty bickering and fault finding and urged more constructive impulses. He analyzed the spirit of those who are prone to discover flaws as not a sign of greatness, but of rank mediocrity, and said it is the big men who discern merit, and not faults.

"Twenty-six years ago," said Mr. Hutchins, "our organization was founded to represent the middle class, those who win their bread by the sweat of their brows. The impulse that moved our early leaders to organize the United Artisans was the spirit of brotherhood. I wish to leave this thought with you people, and it is my hope that you may take it back to your separate assemblies. Go back to your assemblies determined to encourage and practice the spirit of brotherhood, and to effect a renewed artisanship. It is only with this spirit that our order will grow to power; until, instead of embracing only the northwest, our order will cover the Pacific coast."

Ivan Martin delivered the address of welcome, representing Mayor Otto J. Wilson. Mayor Wilson was unable to be present, having been called out of the city on business.

Following the program the drill contests were held between different assemblies. Three teams were entered for the contest, representing Alberta assembly, Fram assembly and Liberty assembly, all from Portland. The prize of \$20 was awarded to the Liberty assembly drill team.

The Reedsport drill team was on the floor but did not enter the contest. However, that team carried off a special prize offered to the drill team traveling the greatest distance to the convention. Colonel A. T. Woolpert, Sergeant Lee Morelock and Sergeant Harry Plant, all of Salem, were judges of the drill contest. The contest was judged on execution, general carriage and on the ease of marching.

The afternoon session at the armory was devoted to initiation of new members, reports of the officers, selection of the city for next year's convention and business session.
