BID ACCEPTED BY CHERRIANS

Uniformed Delegation and Twenty-Piece Band Leave Here September 16

"We will be there with bells and 100 per cent strong," is the spirit of the message that will be sent by the Cherrians to the Primarians of Vancouver in official acceptance of the invitation to attend the Clarke county prune festival on September 16.

The sending of a delegation to the Washington state fair, which was approved at a meeting of the Cherrians last night, and also to send a 20-piece band. It was the consensus of opinion that a visiting delegation to a convention or a festival loses 80 per cent of its "kick" unless it is accompanied by a band to furnish the requisite jazz; hence, the decision to take a brass band to the prune festival.

It was announced that the courtesy will be returned by the Primarians on Booster day at the state fair. The Cherrians are to leave Salem early on the morning of September 16.

Two other invitations were officially accepted at the meeting last night—one from the Linn county fair at Albany on October 4, and one from the Lane county fair at Eugene on September 27.

The "proviso" for the acceptance of the Lane county invitation resembled the one submitted to Vancouver. The Cherrians are to take a band to Eugene on their visit, and the Radiators of Eugene are to visit Salem on Booster day with a band.

Many of those present at the meeting last night were enthusiastic over the acceptance to the invitation of the Linn county fair.

It was pointed out that this visit to Albany will be the first official visit of the Cherrians to that city. No band will be taken to Albany.
