

### Tearing Down of Old Catholic Hall Begun

The process of tearing down old St. Joseph's hall, adjacent to St. Joseph's Catholic church on Chemeketa street, began yesterday.

The building, which has an important place in the history of the Catholic church in Salem, is to give place to a new building which will have a wider range of usefulness than the old building. The new building will be used for social and educational purposes.

### ALL RECORDS ARE BEATEN, DONEY AVERS

Brilliant Year Is Predicted for Willamette by University Head  
FACULTY IS ENLARGED  
New Lausanne Hall, Though Not Quite Complete, to be Used at Once

All registration records at Willamette university are deemed to be shattered in the opinion of the authorities at the university. This prediction is based on the many inquiries coming from new students, and on the many others who have already declared their intention to enroll. College opens September 15.

According to President Carl Gregg Doney, slightly in excess of 100 women have already submitted applications for rooms in new Lausanne hall. This, said Mr. Doney, indicates that the housing problem will be a serious one to contend with this fall. However, it is his opinion that rooms will be obtained for all students.

The new Lausanne hall will not be completed at the opening of college. Many of the women will be quartered in the new women's dormitory under temporary inconveniences. The first floor is now complete for habitation, but additional work needs to be done on the second and third floors. The plumbing is not yet completed. Some of the girls may be temporarily quartered in private homes.

Waller hall, which has been in a process of renovation during the past summer, will be completed for occupation and use about a week or two after the opening of the fall term. The chapel auditorium which is situated in Waller hall will be ready for service soon after the opening of the university. The seats, which were ordered from an eastern firm, will not be installed for several weeks, due to the inability of the manufacturers to furnish them. Dr. Doney received a communication from the manufacturers yesterday, saying the new seats would be shipped within 40 days. In the meantime the old seats are to be installed in the auditorium.

Two literary societies, the Websterians and the Philodorian, will be able to occupy their quarters on the third floor of Waller hall. Both of the literary societies suffered heavy losses in the fire which destroyed the interior of Waller hall last winter. Insurance covering a portion of the loss and contributions from members have enabled the societies to refurbish their halls. The Websterian society was founded 13 years ago, while the Philodorian literary society is the oldest on the Pacific coast having been founded in 1882. Both of the societies play an important part in student activities.

Six new instructors and assistants have been added to the faculty of Willamette. Student assistants will also be used in some of the departments. The following are the new professors on the Willamette faculty: Prof. F. M. Erickson, an associate in the department of philosophy, psychology and education, of which Dr. Charles Sherman is the head; Miss M. L. Harding, the successor of Prof. Della Crowder-Miller as head of the public speaking department; Prof. E. C. Richards, associate in the English department under Prof. John R. Sikes; Miss Helen Hanna, associate in modern languages under Prof. G. Ebsen; Prof. E. W. Hobson, successor of Dr. John R. Sikes as dean of the college of music.

Professor Hertzog is to have charge of Christian work among the students. After spending her vacation with her parents in New York, Miss Edith Benedict, the registrar, returned to Salem last week and has resumed her duties at the university.

### MAKES BEST FISH JUDGE

Misses Weight of Big Salmon at Fitts Market by Only Half Pound

Apparently human eyes deceive, for out of 300 Salemites who participated in the salmon weight guessing contest held yesterday afternoon at the Fitts market on Court street, only a third of that number was able to guess within 20 pounds of the actual weight. Many visited the shop, made a guess, and are now on record as being poor judges of fish. Frank M. Mapes won.

Two large salmon, one from Yaquina bay and one from Nehalem bay, were received Thursday from a fishing company at Newport by the Fitts market. The salmon were among the largest ever purchased here. W. S. Fitts conceived the idea that a weight-guessing contest would furnish good sport for his patrons. Accordingly he placarded his shop window announcing the conditions of the weight-guessing contest. No one was barred. All one had to do was write his name on the weight-guessing book and opposite his name indicate his guess. For the one making the nearest guess Mr. Fitts offered a large portion of the salmon. By 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon 290 Salemites had hazarded guesses ranging between 157 pounds and 29 1/2 pounds. The salmon tipped the beam at 41 pounds when weighed at the close of the contest at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Mapes, the winner, made a guess of 40 1/2 pounds.
