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## TIMBER AND WATER POWER IN SALEM DISTRICT

John H. Lewis, then State Engineer, in the official "Oregon Almanac," published in 1915, wrote these words:  
"Approximately 20,000,000 horsepower, or one-third of all the undeveloped water power in the United States, is located in the Columbia River basin."  
Some one has recently said that half the water power of the United States is in the three Pacific Coast states, Washington, Oregon and California.  
Another authority says one-fifth of the standing timber of the United States is in Oregon.  
Still another, that the timber supplies of the region east of the Rocky mountains will be exhausted in 14 years; that every manufacturing concern, even a steel plant, must have some wood, for crates and boxes; that on the average 25 per cent. of the raw materials of manufacturing plants is of wood.  
Therefore, manufacturing plants will have to come where wood may be had—and that the great bulk of the timber of this continent is on the western slope; in Alaska, British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, California and the Pacific coast of Mexico.  
And all this with three-quarters of the population of the world just across the Pacific ocean; just at our back doors, considered in the terms of cheap ocean transportation.  
Add to all this the fact that coal and all other fuels are growing constantly scarcer and higher, and that the great field of the immediate and distant future for hydro electric engineering and investments is along this coast—  
And the duldest of us ought to see visions of a great future for the Pacific Coast states.

Last week's Salem Slogan issue of The Statesman brought out the fact that there are officially outlined water power projects in the Salem district that will, when developed, give us the use of 130,000 horsepower—  
And some of these are very near and very cheap of development; and none of them far away; and all of them capable of being developed at small comparative cost.  
And Salem is in the center of a great part of Oregon's immense timber supply, in the foothills and upper slopes of the Coast Range and the Cascades—  
And along the banks of the Willamette.  
It is all down grade to Salem.  
Salem should have a great furniture factory.  
There are numerous other kinds of wood working plants that should be located here—  
And will be; must be, on account of the abundant supplies of raw materials and the easily and cheaply developed water powers to run the manufacturing machinery.

This is the 51st Salem Slogan issue of The Statesman. There is one more; next week, when the subject will be the new Salem paper mill, concerning which a large amount of new information will be given.  
Then will commence another campaign of a year to still better inform ourselves and the world concerning our most important basic industries and interests.  
The list will not necessarily be the same as that used the present year; but it will likely be about the same, though many new facts and angles will be found—as many have been found during the present year—and the Salem Slogan editor has been as much surprised as his readers have over many new facts that have come up to prove that Salem is absolutely the solidest city in the world; because it has the greatest combination of basic industries of any city in the world.  
Salem's is now and will be a Gibraltar growth.  
Nothing can seriously disturb the prosperity of a city that is so bound up with the resources of a great agricultural country; and in addition has great timber resources; great water power available; great mines to be opened; great schools in the making, and many lines of fruit that are peculiarly our own, with a world demand for their products.  
Many other slogan subjects have been suggested, as kale, peaches, quinces, plums, tomatoes, garlic, horseradish, mushrooms, artichokes, buckwheat, sour cherries, sunflowers, rhubarb, land drainage and irrigation, etc., and some of these and perhaps others may be taken up singly or combined in future issues; and the Salem Slogan editor is always open for suggestions and solicitous of help—and not modest about asking the latter, either, for he considers this campaign as a most important one, in which every person having a stake in Salem ought to be vitally interested.

Resolutions were offered to amend the by-laws of the Business Men's League in regard to advertising. The matter will be considered at a special meeting to be held early in October.
