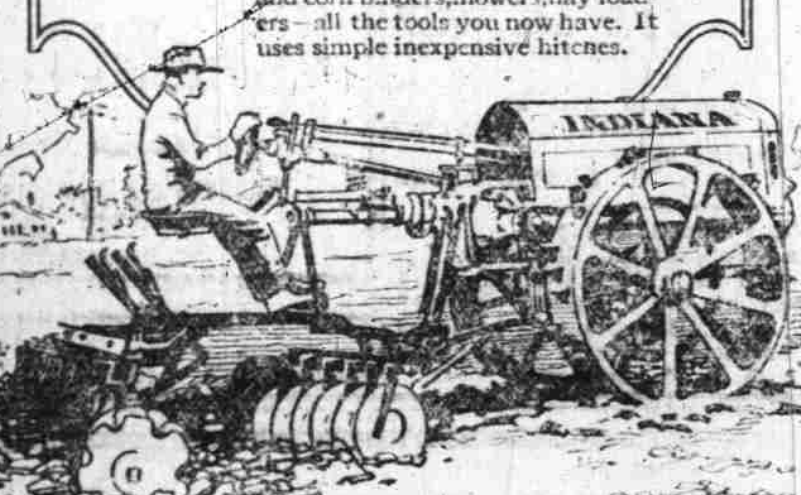

CHAMP BATTLE NEXT SUNDAY

Senators Among Baseball Teams of Nation Struggling for Supremacy

The baseball situation has slumped down to survival of the fittest. The first days of October will find numerous baseball teams throughout America battling for the season's reward and highest supremacy—the coveted pennant.

The Salem Senators will be among those teams contending for championship honors when they meet the Honeyman Hardware baseball team of Portland in this city next Sunday afternoon at Oxford park. The state championship for independent baseball hangs on the outcome of the game.

With the announcement that strengthened lineups will be presented to the fans next Sunday emanating from the headquarters of the Senators and the Honeyman team, the game promises to be a real scrap. Weaknesses displayed by the teams in previous games are to be remedied by new players.

New Material Added

Walter Kracke, the Senator skipper, announces the addition of two players for the titular clash with the Honeyman team next Sunday. They are Eddie Zweifel, twirler, and Eddie Bogart, an outfielder. Bogart and Zweifel are players of big time calibre, and will materially strengthen the Senators. Zweifel, it is said, was the pitching ace last summer in the Canadian league and his performance induced the Cincinnati National league to sign him for next season.

Eddie Bogart, a Portland athlete and until the close of the western league season a member of the Joplin baseball team, will perform in the outer gardens for the Senators. The St. Louis Cardinals purchased Bogart from the Joplin team, and he will report to them in the spring.

With the new acquisitions, it is the opinion of Kracke that the Senators have better than an even chance to cop the final game. In Zweifel he claims a twirler who will cause the Honeyman team to slip the bitter dregs of defeat. In addition to Zweifel, Kracke announces that "King" Cole will don a Senator uniform, ready to answer the S. O. S. Call. Cole, after leaving the Senators in mid-season, performed creditably while hurling in the Rose City league for the Crown-Willamette team of Oregon City. Walter McCredie, manager of the Portland Beavers, signed Cole for next season's try-out, it is said.

Probable Lineup Announced

According to Kracke, the probable lineup of the Senators will be: Blanchard, 1b, Proctor 2d, Miller as, and Bishop 3d. Outfield: Stewart, Stopp, Bogart and Hayes. Batteries: Kracke, catcher and Zweifel and Cole, pitcher. Bishop is placed at the torrid corner to give the Senators stonewall defense and to increase the hitting potentiality of the team, says Kracke. It was thought yesterday that Stewart would be held in reserve.

Elly Stepp, who pastimes in centerfield for the Senators and who is also the official representative of the Senators in Portland, has informed Kracke that the Honeyman team is coming to Salem strengthened with the best semi-professional material in Portland, also that the Senators are to receive a drubbing at the instance of the Honeyman team. The baseball diamond at Oxford park is to be prepared for the championship game next Sunday afternoon. Kracke announced that care would have to be taken to have a fast field for the game.

FRENCH ENDORSE WILSON.

ORLEANS, France, Sept. 20.—Speaking today at the French labor congress, Leon Jouhaux, president of the general federation of labor, said the French federation from the first had been in favor of the league of nations.

"It has endorsed the policy of President Wilson, defender of a lasting peace through liberty and independence of nations," he declared. "The results did not reach expectations because President Wilson's ideas were defeated."

OFFICER KILLED IN RAID.

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Oct. 1.—A score of deputies and policemen were speeding early today to Kemp City, an oil camp near here, to quell a possible disturbance following a raid last night on a gambling house in which one officer, W. W. Belcher, was slain and another wounded. Excitement was said to be running high. The slayer has been captured.

MINERS GO TO WORK

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 30.—Five thousand miners in strike in western Kentucky were instructed by Union officials to return to work Monday following the reaching of an agreement today on a wage increase. Day and monthly men were given an increase of \$1.50 a day and drivers \$1.75 per retroactive to August 16, 1920.

FOOTBALL PLAYER DIES.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 30.—Melvin Keppler, 17 years old, captain of the Lochhaven high school football team, died today from a broken neck received during a scrimmage practice Wednesday.

8 ACCIDENTS ARE FATAL

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 30.—Eight persons lost their lives through accidents in Portland in September according to records compiled today by the coroner's office. There were two suicides and one man was shot to death.
