stand me now—I am not in favor of that covenant.
America Is Not Welcher
"You note the contrast. America is not a welcher. If you do go in and don't keep your promises you have made it a colossal disappointment of all time. So I say to you, women of America, let us in good conscience play our part, not only by example, but by helping the cause of humanity and forwarding civilization as we have done from the beginning of our republic; but let us hold to ourselves the right to determine what America's obligation is to the rest of the world."

"Everyone connected with baseball would be absolutely under control of this tribunal. If an owner committed an unethical act, the tribunal could reprimand him, fine him or even revoke his franchise."
"Likewise, it would be empowered to establish a proper relationship between minor and major leagues."
"The conduct of the player on the field, the rules governing the game also will be subject to the final and arbitrary review and dictum of the tribunal. It is unthinkable that in such an environment and under such supervision anything unclean or unsportsmanlike could even remotely creep into the national game."
The letter requests club owners to sign an enclosed memorandum and return it to Mr. Veeck.
