

RED CROSS IS SEEN AT FAIR

Work for Humanity Well Illustrated at Booth in Educational Building

One of the most interesting booths on the state fair grounds, and the one that will probably be most resultant of future good is the exhibits in the Educational building, conducted by the American Red Cross, with Mrs. Alice H. Dodd, secretary of Willamette chapter, directly in charge. Assisting in this booth are Miss Mira Fletcher of Seattle, who is a trained nurse with the northwestern division of the Red Cross, and Miss Lillian Godsey, Mayton county's new health nurse.

The two latter have demonstrated essential items in home nursing each day, including the making of the bed with the patient in it, change of sheets, bath, and other similar things. Moving pictures, under the auspices of the Red Cross, have also been an important phase of this year's work.

The display made by the junior Red Cross has been especially interesting and worthwhile. A table full of dolls, with placards pleading for fresh air, regular habits, correct environment, and an abandonment of soothing syrups, pacifiers, and so on, for the child, has preached a subtle sermon to parents and guardians.

Boys and girls visiting this booth are told of the wonderful endeavors of the organization, and their support invited. They are told that any boy or girl who subscribed to the junior Red Cross News is entitled to membership, and shown how by a bit of self-denial what great good can be wrought in the world. As an instance of this youthful assistance the city of Spokane boasts a children's hospital, owned and operated by the children of the different schools.

Many new departments will be added to the Red Cross during the coming year, including school work, public health centers, home nursing classes and life saving classes. The universally known poster, the "Greatest Mother in the World," will still be utilized as the official advertisement, but will be changed to represent post war activities.

Salem will continue the work on a more progressive line, an effort to be made to keep in the county Miss Godsey, and also to continue the home nursing classes. These will start again about the middle of October, anyone wishing to join being instructed to call either Mrs. Dodd or Mrs. E. E. Fisher, chairman of the local home nursing class.

Miss Jessie U. Cox will arrive in Salem the first of the week and will make a survey of the counties of Polk and Marion to

discern the extent of assistance needed, and to make a general survey by which future outlines of activities will be largely determined.

Treasury Refilled by Provi Violators

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 1.—Violators of the federal prohibition act in the state of Washington have brought \$125,000 into the United States treasury during the first six months in which the act has been in force according to the report of Donald A. McDonald, federal director for this district, given out today. The cost to the government during the same period, for the maintenance of the department has been \$3,000, the report states, with 118 convictions out of 178 arrests.

Duck Season Not Open Until Middle of Month

The duck season is not open throughout the Willamette valley until October 15, says Roy Bremner, district game warden, although it is open in some of the coast counties. Another precaution thrown out for the benefit of hunters is that it is unlawful to hunt inside the city limits or on state land in the vicinity of Salem. It is unlawful to hunt quail of any species in the Willamette valley.

BOUNDARIES OF SCHOOLS CHANGE

Recommendations of Principals Sanctioned by Salem School Board

Upon recommendation of the principals, sanctioned by the board of education, the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades of the Washington school will be distributed among the Garfield, Englewood, Richmond and Park schools. The reason for the transfer is mainly the crowded condition of the Washington junior high school. By removing these grades from the Washington building more space will be available for the junior high school classes. The first and second grades will still remain in the Washington school. This leaves the small or pupils in the building. The transfer means that no pupil will need to go to his respective school more than 10 blocks.

The boundary lines of the Highland and the Lincoln schools have not been changed. The junior high school boundary lines are the same as last year. The lines for the first and second grades of the Washington district will remain the same as last year. The change in redistricting the various school districts will only affect the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades.

No pupils will be admitted to the first grade who have not had previous work in some other school after October 15. No pupils will be admitted to the first grade who are not 6 years old before November 15. The tuition for the first six grades will be \$20 per year, for the seventh grade will be \$40 per year and for the high school, including ninth grade will be \$85. All pupils will report to their respective buildings at 9 o'clock on Monday morning, Oct. 4.

There will be a general meeting of all the teachers of the public schools of Salem at 10 o'clock this morning in the high school auditorium at that meeting the teachers will be assigned to their respective buildings and grades. To accommodate the Commercial Book store, the school authorities have made the following arrangement: All junior high school pupils will secure books from 1 to 6 o'clock Monday. Senior high school pupils will secure books after Monday. The book store will be open at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Pacific Synod Goes to Salt Lake City

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 1.—The fourth synod of the Pacific province of the Protestant Episcopal church will be held at Salt Lake City next year, it was voted today at the closing business session of the third synod, in session here. The dates of next year's synod will be announced later by the governing council. Bishop Hermann Pace of Spokane, Wash., Bishop W. T. Sumner of Oregon and Bishop W. F. Nichols of California addressed the meeting today and Bishop A. W. Moulton of Utah and H. C. Wykoff, layman of California, were scheduled for addresses at a mass meeting at St. Mark's Episcopal church tonight. Threatened action prohibiting its membership from participating in modern dancing, depreciation of prevalence of gambling among youth of both sexes and smoking by women, condemnation of increasing sex appeal of motion picture films, condemnation of the "divorce evil" and a plea for mutual forbearance and consideration in the relations of employer and employee, were the features of the resolutions of the social service today.

Is Your Child Under Weight?

The table below will show you what your child should weigh to be in proper proportion to his height. If the child is below the "danger point" it is time to act.

Heights and weights are given separately for boys and girls. Averages are given for births, for 3 months, for every month from 6 to 48, and there after for every year up to 16. The heights and weights of the children examined are to be compared with the average heights and weights. No heights and weights are given for the separate months after 48 months. With a child over 4 years of age, use the age at his last birthday.
