AT RANDOM
The Japanese government is asking the United States government to prevent the state of California passing an anti-Japanese land ownership law. Statistics show that the Japanese control 16 per cent of the farm land and orchard land of California. In requesting from the United States government relief from prohibitive measures threatened in California, the Japanese are basing their demands upon a treaty, so it is said.

It is certainly a short-sighted policy on the part of the Japanese to believe that they can live in the state of California with any degree of peace and prosperity if the people of that state did not want them there, even if the government should feel bound to some treaty which permits them to enter the state. It is merely another case of where a foreigner does not understand the temper of the American people, nor the way we have of exercising federal authority throughout the union and also the way we have of obeying in the capacity of a sovereign state. While each state respects the federal law, yet no federal law ever becomes oppressive. So, if California does not want the Japanese, the Japanese will find it out, treaty or no treaty.

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been heard from other parts of the Pacific coast and inland as far as Idaho and Utah. The Japanese question promises to be acute for the reason that the Japanese, in a financial way, are deeply involved with property owners on the coast. Then again, it is said by friends of the Japanese, that the Japanese never became a menace until they began to compete with the merchant as long as they confined their operations here to competing with the laboring man, it is further said, they were not considered a menace, and cheap Japanese labor was a welcome relief to hold over the white man.

That the Japanese are too progressive to live in a foreign country like the United States without raising serious trouble is self-evident. The Chinaman, who has lived peacefully many years on the coast, and is still running his shab-bus on the streets, and his hand clothes-cart, used 25 years ago, can still be seen on the streets. Sans progress. The progressive Japanese are not satisfied to work forever in the section like the Chinaman, but took to gardening, and finally owning the land. In the cities their latest models of automobiles both for pleasure and delivery purposes, are conspicuous on the streets.

The Japanese are showing too much progressiveness, evidently, for a non-assimilating race of people to live in a foreign country without criticism and dislike. Whether their financial interests, coupled with Americans profiting through them, is greater than the public feeling against their encroachment is, of course, a matter of future adjustment. Perhaps the treaty will have to be revised.

MR. BROWN TO FINISH WORK

Newly Appointed Justice Delays Resignation as Attorney General

While George M. Brown, attorney general, has accepted his appointment by Governor Olcott as a member of the supreme court, he will not resign as attorney general until he finishes some very important pending business in the attorney general's office. He so declares himself in a telegram sent from Pendleton to the governor.

Brown is now in Pendleton where he is assisting in the prosecution of two men who were involved in the jail break that resulted in the slaying of Sheriff Till Taylor.

In accepting the resignation of Justice Alfred S. Bennett, whom Brown will succeed as an associate justice of the supreme court, Governor Olcott expresses appreciation of the high quality of service which Judge Bennett has given the state and regret at his decision to leave the bench.

"I desire to express my deep appreciation for the splendid work which you have done upon the supreme bench," writes the governor. "It is a source of gratification to know that the people, by the election of such men yourself, keep the personnel of the bench up to the highest standard, and while I realize the circumstances which force you to leave your duties with the state, I am certain the people of Oregon as a whole have deep appreciation of the services which you have rendered. I wish you only the greatest success and happiness on your return to civil life."

Oregon City People Want Better Depot Facilities

The Oregon City Commercial club, through a committee composed of Wallace B. Canfield, A. A. Brice and Thomas F. Ryan, has registered a protest with the public service commission against the inadequate depot facilities of the Southern Pacific company at that place, and the practice of the railroad company in unloading livestock at the passenger depot and leading them across the passenger platform.

Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the commission, has informed A. T. Mercer, superintendent of the Southern Pacific, of the complaint and has asked a detailed investigation and a report to the commission on the findings.

The Oregon City commission shows that the present depot was built more than 50 years ago and that it is much crowded both as to freight and passenger facilities. Much time is lost to shipping, it is said, because of the lack of facilities.

An order was issued by the public service commission yesterday requiring the Pacific Light & Power company to extend a single phase volt wire from Gearhart and Warrenton, respectively, as most convenient to the power company, toward the Clatsop plains district near Carnahan station, so that electricity may be available to the residents of the district. The order is in accord with a stipulation entered into at a hearing in which service was demanded by Pacific Grange No. 413. The district is thickly populated.

SEVERAL WANT BROWN'S POST

Bailey and Van Winkle Candidates, Benjamin and Grant May Rule

A rumor is about the state capital that Joseph A. Benjamin, one of the assistant attorneys general of the state, may resign and become a candidate for attorney general at the November elections.

J. O. Bailey, another of the assistants, already has resigned and has announced himself as a candidate.

I. H. Van Winkle, first assistant in the department, whose Governor Olcott has appointed to succeed George M. Brown has announced that he will become a candidate for election in November.

Benjamin's work with the department has been mainly in litigation connected with the state industrial accident commission. Bailey has done a large amount of legal work in connection with the public service commission. Van Winkle's work has been of general nature. Also Benjamin and Bailey have done general work in the department.

There is some speculation here relative to whether Frank S. Grant of Portland may become a candidate. Also the name of J. J. Johnson of Portland is mentioned.

Attorney General Brown, who posed of William B. Canfield, A. the supreme court, is now in Pendleton assisting in the prosecution of the two men implicated in the slaying of Sheriff Till Taylor, and in a telegram to the governor yesterday says he will delay his resignation as attorney general long enough to dispose of some important business that is now pending in the state legal department.

The governor first appointed T. B. Handley to succeed Brown, but Handley did not accept and Van Winkle was named.
