We should like to see some more men move to adjoin when a lady has the floor in some future congress.

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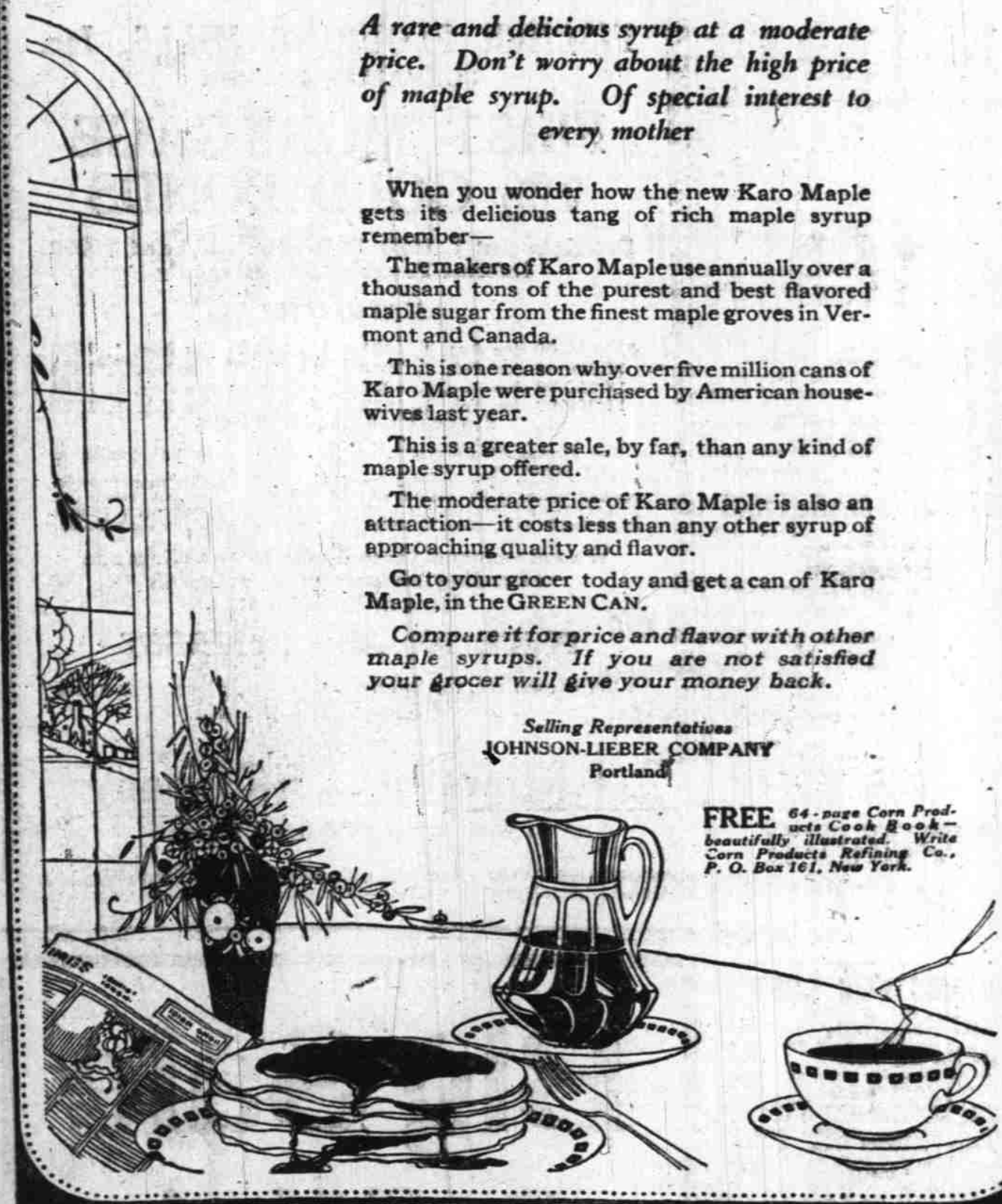
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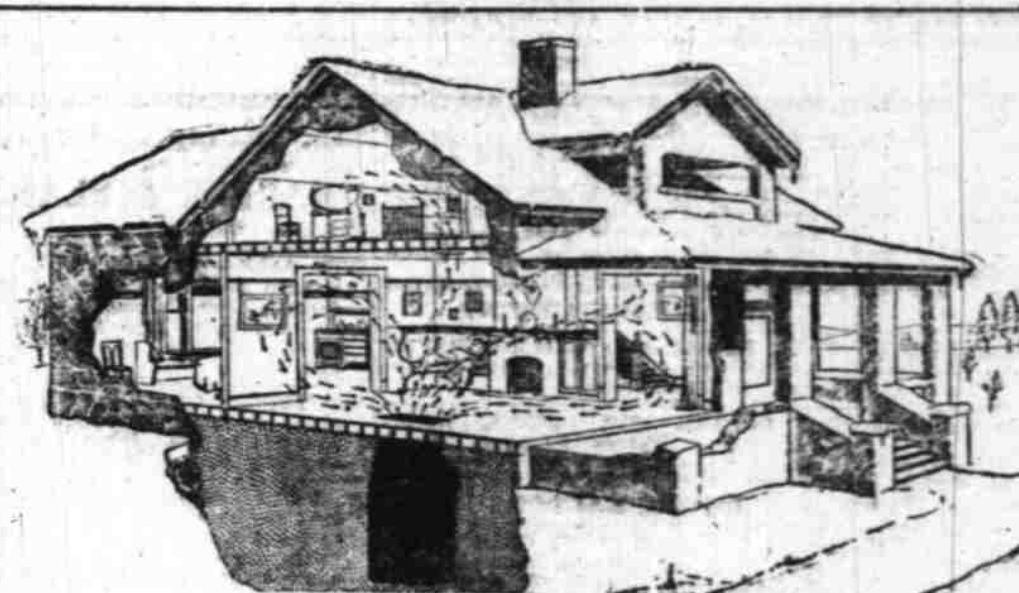

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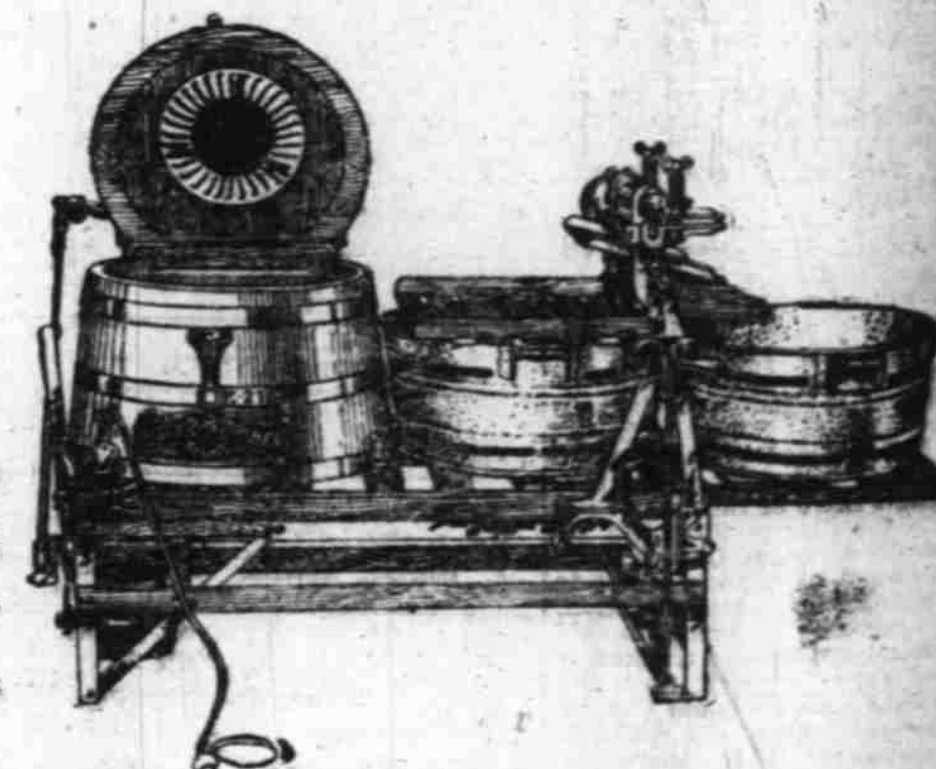


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
