Graham Funeral Today—Funeral services will be held today for Mrs. Amanda Graham, who died at her home near Fruitland Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. She was 79 years old. The funeral service will be at 2 o'clock p. m. today from the Macleay Evangelical church.

The Get-together Meeting—Of the First Congregational church has been postponed indefinitely.

Fish Cases Argued—Arguments were heard by the Oregon supreme court yesterday in the case brought by the Union Fisheries Co-operative Packing company of Astoria to enjoin the state fish and game commission from enforcing the law enacted at the 1919 session of the legislature prohibiting the selling, buying or having in possession any fish caught outside of the Columbia river beyond the three-mile limit during the closed seasons. The action was first tried in the circuit court for Clatsop county with the result that a verdict was returned in favor of the state. Appeal to the supreme court then was taken by the plaintiffs. J. C. Bailey, assistant attorney general, appeared before the supreme court here today in behalf of the fish commission. Senator A. W. Norblad of Astoria represented the packing company.

Compton Returns—L. H. Compton, warden of the state penitentiary, returned yesterday from Pendleton where he was called as a witness in the trial of Jack Rathie and Jim Owens, charged with being implicated in the murder of Till Taylor, former

sheriff of Umatilla county. Rathie and Owens were convicted by a jury at Pendleton last night, and will be sentenced Friday. Under the Oregon criminal statutes both men will be hanged for the part they played in the crime.

Judge Is Lenient—W. D. Byrnes of Portland, who was arrested during fair week for having a quantity of liquor in his possession, was given a hearing yesterday morning. Owing to the fact that Byrnes is but 19 years old, and it appearing through evidence that this was his first and only offense, Police Judge Earl Race placed his fine at only \$75. This is the first offense in an ordinary case of this nature, would be fixed at \$100 fine and 20 days in jail.

Budget for 1921 Adopted by Y. M. C. A. Directors—The Y. M. C. A. board of directors met at a luncheon given at noon Tuesday in the Y. M. C. A. building. Writers and Scientists Take Three Year Cruise—SEATTLE, Oct. 6.—Equipped for a three years' cruise around the world, the auxiliary yacht, Wisdom II, formerly the Anemone, of the University of Washington naval training station, left this port late today in command of Capt. E. A. Salisbury of Los Angeles, heading a party of writers and scientists. Captain Salisbury said he would touch at Los Angeles, and take on other members of the party and from that point sail into the south seas. The itinerary includes at least a year among the South Sea islands. New Zealand, New Guinea, Africa, Borneo and Mediterranean countries are included. The cruise will end with visits to south and central American countries, Captain Salisbury said. The Wisdom II is a Welch-tugged auxiliary yacht of 85 tons.
