Withholds Publication of Resolutions on Japs

TOKIO, Oct. 6.—The Kensei-Kai party which is opposed to the government, has voted not to publish resolutions adopted by the party on the California situation. "In view of their grave significance," but to watch developments and adopt measures according to the trend of the situation. The Nichi Nichi, however, today summarizes the views of the party as follows:

"The anti-Japanese movement is local and premature, when considering it as affecting all America. It is improper to get excited and indulge in strong utterances against America.

"Japan should follow the indicated steps to protect the rights of her nationals in the belief that the supreme court will nullify illegal California enactments. If these steps fail Japan will be justified in resorting to other measures.

"Japan's ill-advised diplomacy has contributed to the American situation, especially through the racial equality proposed at Paris. It was inevitable that the United States and Canada would interpret the proposal as a prelude to the solution of immigration problems. Furthermore, the government's policy in Siberia and China, which did not conform to the world situation, has produced an undesirable misunderstanding abroad that Japan is adopting the path of militarism.

These and other things have contributed to the anti-Japanese movement in California, and therefore the government should be held responsible to effect a solution of the situation satisfactory to the will of the nation.

Merchant Tailors Are Refused New Contracts

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—A temporary restraining order, forbidding Ray Barkhurst and Robert Greenland, merchant tailors, from entering into additional contracts with the Journeymen Tailors' union, local No. 47, governing hours and wages, was issued by Presiding Circuit Judge Tazewell this morning upon the petition of 25 other merchant tailors of Portland. A motion to make the temporary order permanent will be argued October 20.

The restraining order was issued upon a complaint filed in the circuit court today by John W. Kaste, alleging that Barkhurst and Greenland have violated the terms of a contract entered into by all of the merchant tailors in the city following a controversy with the unions last September.

According to the complaint the tailors agreed that they would not enter into contracts with the

unions that had not been endorsed by all of the tailors. It is claimed also that they agreed to liquidate damages of \$100 for each violation. A claim of \$2500 for damages is made against each of the defendants.

Guarantee Practice Stabilizes Prices

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The practice of manufacturers' guarantee against price decline was characterized by representatives of business interests employing the device who appeared today at the federal trade commission hearing. They urged the commission to follow a hands-off policy and decide complaints against the system on the merits of individual cases.

The commission concluded its open investigation although briefs may be filed during the next 30 days. Proponents of the guarantee practice emphatically denied that it aided in maintaining high prices. On the contrary, they declared it had resulted in an immediate passing on of price reductions by manufacturers to consumers. As the manufacturer assumed the risk of losses, the dealer was forced through competition to sell at his lowest figure, speakers argued.

W. T. Nardin, St. Louis, declared that the evaporated milk industry which he represented, could not avoid the practice and that sales could not be carried on effectively due to the nature of the product without giving the dealers such protection. He challenged the statement that few guarantors ever had paid or had been called upon to pay through price reduction, citing cases where refunds had run into thousands "and even tens of thousands of dollars in a single year."

Roosevelt Seeks Support of League

PUEBLO, Colo., Oct. 6.—Support for the national Democratic ticket because it favors going into the league of nations and affords the best opportunity for the development of the wonderful resources of the west, was asked by Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic vice presidential nominee, in an address here tonight before an audience which filled the municipal auditorium.

Private advice received by Mr. Roosevelt from friends in the east show, he said, "a tremendous change in public sentiment on the league of nations issue," and "promise a heavy independent Republican vote for Governor Cox, especially in the states of New York, Kentucky and West Virginia."

"As the campaign progresses," he said, "it becomes increasingly clear that Mr. Harding is appealing more and more to the fears of the country and less and less to the faith of the country. The so-called Republican leaders have no leadership, not even of common purpose except the purpose of criticism and complaint of anything suggested or accomplished by anyone else."

War Between U. S. and Japan Is Impossible

HONOLULU, Oct. 6.—War between the United States and Japan is "impossible and unthinkable," C. Yada, recently appointed Japanese consul general here, declared in an address he made at a banquet he gave here recently to American and Japanese army and navy officers and civilians.

The banquet was given during the visit here of the American Pacific fleet, under Admiral Hugh Rodman and the Japanese cruiser Kamae, Capt. C. Terachi, which stopped at Honolulu while en route home from the Maine centennial celebration.

Among the guests and speakers were Governor Charles J. McCarthy of Hawaii, Maj. Gen. Charles G. Morton, commanding the Hawaiian department of the army, and Rear Admiral J. S. McKean.

Initial Meetings Held by Literary Societies

Va., Oct. 6.—One deputy sheriff was killed, three others were wounded seriously and two miners were shot in a fight tonight at Blair, Logan county, West Virginia, on the Little Coal river, according to information received here by Fred Mooney, secretary of district 17, United Mine Workers of America. Mooney announced that a report on the fight indicated that the trouble started when the deputy sheriff interrupted a meeting of Blair local, No. 2387, United Mine Workers. He added that according to information received by him, Joseph Gore, Logan county deputy sheriff was killed and that one miner was wounded probably fatally.
