

PURCHASE LAND IS ADVOCATED

Forestry Officials Present Recommendations to Head of Committee

Purchase by the state of an irregular strip of timber land along the Seaside-Cannon Beach

highway from the Crown-Williamette Paper company and other owners, as the most effective means of preserving the scenic beauties of that much traveled highway, was the recommendation contained in a report submitted to W. B. Ayer of Portland by F. A. Elliott, state forester; C. S. Chapman, of the western forestry and conservation association and George H. Cecil, district forester, with headquarters in Portland. Mr. Ayer is chairman of the committee appointed some time ago by Governor Olcott to investigate and devise plans for conserving the forests abutting Oregon's scenic highways.

"The strip should be laid out," said the report, "with a view to keeping a screen of timber sufficiently wide to hide cuttings back of it. While some of this timber might blow down, a great deal of it is not large and will probably stand. Logging in part of this area will again commence next spring and prompt action, if any is to be taken, is therefore indicated."

"It might be stated that areas along the Seaside-Cannon Beach road, south of its junction with

the Tillamook road, are not of agricultural value, but constitute true forest land of little value other than for growing successive crops of timber. The state could doubtless purchase areas along the highway, when cut over, for a very nominal sum, or certain areas might be donated to the state to be held for all time as state forest land. By this means young timber would be protected, revenue eventually secured from the new crop, and the cutting of future forests could be so regulated as to preserve the scenic beauties of the highway.

"A thing to consider also in connection with the leaving of timber along this road is its probable permanence. It would appear that a better alignment is entirely possible."

The foresters inspected the Seaside-Cannon Beach highway last Saturday, later submitting their report to Mr. Ayer, who sent a copy of the document to Governor Olcott. Just what action will be taken by the governor's committee, of which Mr. Ayer is chairman, will be determined at a meeting of that body to be held later in the month.

Salem's permanent auto camp offering a haven for the wayfarer, a haven that was instituted with no thought of material gain, but which, like most things that are given with a right good will, has proved a financial asset to the city and surrounding country. For no real estate agent, searching for a clever scheme to boom his business could have hit upon a more successful plan than to establish such a camping place for tourists.

Tuesday night the ninth sale of property within the past three weeks was reported by T. G. Albert, superintendent of the camp. The newcomer is F. W. Lawrence of Wallace, Idaho, his purchase being the Bradford acreage, located just east of the fair grounds. With his wife he was making a leisurely journey southward, looking for a place to make his permanent home. Salem being the first place that met every requirement.

Although the vacation season reached its logical end some time ago, auto tourists, like the brook, apparently run on forever, 31 machines being reported Tuesday night. Earlier in the year, however, this number was greatly increased, some nights from 50 to 75 cars being parked on the camp grounds.

Tourists have no tales to tell of bad or impassable roads as yet, the only difficulty encountered in the state being between Eugene and Roseburg. Most of the cars are traveling south.

Wednesday morning a representative and camera man from the Spokesman-Review, of Spokane, stopped off to give the Salem camp the once-over, and as a result carried away with them a realistic material for publicity, as well as pictures of the grounds. Both men stated that the local camp was the best encountered since leaving the Yellowstone national park.

They rob the sick, steal the property of the hospitals, steal wood to take home, and help themselves to linen nightgowns and blankets. Each physician has 150 to 200 patients. Many are ruining their health contracting diseases from the patients.

The report concludes as follows: "It is impossible not to be horrified by the scenes in everyday life of the unfortunate inhabitants of Petrograd. It is impossible not to be moved by their struggle with hunger, the weather, and by the thousands of deaths occurring every month, which threaten the speedy dying off of the remainder of the population of this former great Russian capital."
